The following communication was read from His Excellency, the Governor:

> STATE OF MINNESOTA. EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT, ST. PAUL, Feb. 9, 1901.

Hon. Lyndon A. Smith, President of the Senate:

SIR: I have the honor to advise you that I have approved, signed and deposited in the office of the Secretary of State the following Senate Files:

S. F. No. 13, "An act to amend section two thousand two hunhundred and seventy-nine (2279) of the General Statutes of one thousand eight hundred and ninety-four (1894), relating to the duties of the reporter of the Supreme Court."

S. F. No. 66, "An act fixing the salary of Assistant County Attorneys in counties having a population of not less than seventy-five thousand (75,000) and not more than one hundred thousand (100,000) inhabitants."

S. F. No. 94, "A joint resolution of the Senate and House of Representatives of the State of Minnesota, making application to the Congress of the United States, under article five (5) of the constitution, for the submission of an amendment to said constitution, making United States Senators elective in the several states by popular vote."
