H. F. No. 404, "A joint memorial of the Senate and House of Representatives of the State of Minnesota, recommending the election of United States Senators by a popular vote."

H. F. No. 36, "An act declaring it a misdemeanor on the part of employers to require as a condition of employment the surrender of any right of citizenship," and have deposited the same in the office of the Secretary of State.
