H. F. No. 95: A resolution memorializing Congress to call a convention for the purpose of amending the United States Constitution to provide for intergovernmental sharing of federal income tax revenue.

MOTIONS AND RESOLUTIONS

Messrs. Holmquist and Coleman introduced:

SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 2

A senate concurrent resolution relating to living expenses and mileage during the legislative session.

BE IT RESOLVED, by the Senate of the State of Minnesota, the House of Representatives concurring, that the Secretary of the Senate is hereby authorized and directed to prepare and issue warrants in payment of living expenses and mileage to each member of the Senate, and the Chief Clerk of the House of Representatives is hereby authorized and directed to prepare and issue warrants in payment of living expenses and mileage to

each member of the House, from their respective Legislative Expense Funds, for each calendar day of the 1971 Legislative Session.

RESOLVED FURTHER, that per diem living expenses in the sum of \$24 per diem shall be paid to such members who have moved from their usual place of lodging during a substantial part of the 1971 Session of the Legislature;

PROVIDED FURTHER, that the per diem living expenses of members of the Legislature who have not so changed their place of lodging for a substantial part of said Session shall be the sum of \$16 per day.

PROVIDED FURTHER, that those members of the Legislature who are eligible to be paid the per diem of \$24 shall in addition be reimbursed for travel to and from their homes at the rate of nine cents per mile for not to exceed ten round trips.

PROVIDED ALSO, each member of the Legislature shall certify in writing to the Secretary of the Senate or the Chief Clerk of the House of Representatives, prior to the issuance of the first of such warrants for such living expenses and mileage whether or not he has moved from his usual place of lodging.

Mr. Holmquist moved that the foregoing resolution be adopted.

SENATE RESOLUTION NO. 2

A senate resolution authorizing and directing the President of the Senate to send seven members to attend the Red River Valley
