Messrs. Moe, R.D. and Ashbach introduced—

Senate Resolution No. 20: A Senate resolution relating to mileage and per diem living expenses.

BE IT RESOLVED, by the Senate:

Each member who has moved from his usual place of lodging during a substantial part of the sessions of the 72nd Legislature shall receive mileage for necessary travel in going to and returning from the place of meeting to his place of residence in the amount of 19 cents per mile, or any greater amount authorized by the commissioner of employee relations for state employees, for each trip during the 72nd Legislature.

Each member who has moved from his usual place of lodging during a substantial part of the sessions of the 72nd Legislature shall be paid per diem living expenses in the amount of \$36 for each calendar day during the sessions of the 72nd Legislature.

Each member of the Senate who has not changed his place of lodging for a substantial part of the sessions of the 72nd Legislature shall be paid per diem living expenses in the amount of \$23 for each calendar day during the sessions of the 72nd Legislature.

Each member of the Senate shall certify in writing to the Secretary of the Senate prior to the issuance of the first of the warrants for each of the sessions of the 72nd Legislature whether or not he has moved from his usual place of lodging. Each member shall also certify in writing for the actual travel for which he seeks reimbursement.

The Secretary of the Senate shall prepare and issue warrants from the Senate legislative expense fund in payment of mileage and living expenses to each member of the Senate.

Mr. Moe, R.D. moved the adoption of the foregoing resolution.

The question was taken on the adoption of the resolution.

A bill for an act relating to public improvements; authorizing the acquisition and betterment of public land and buildings and other public improvements of a capital nature with certain conditions; authorizing issuance of state bonds; appropriating money.

We, the undersigned conferees for H. F. No. 230, report that we have agreed upon the items in dispute and recommend as follows:

That the Senate recede from its amendment and that H.F. No. 230 be amended as follows:

Delete everything after the enacting clause and insert:

“Section 1. [PUBLIC LAND AND BUILDINGS; APPROPRIATIONS.] The sums set forth in the column designated “APPROPRIATIONS” are appropriated from the state building fund, or any other fund designated, to the state agencies indicated, to be expended for the acquisition and betterment of public land and buildings and other public improvements of a capital nature, as more specifically described in the following sections of this act.
