A quorum was present.

After a welcome and introductions, the first matter under consideration was the Policy on Tuition Reimbursement (P1).

Rep. Paulsen moved that the P1 policy be moved.

Paul Schweizer, House Controller, explained the P1 policy.

Rep. Paulsen renewed his motion that the P1 policy be adopted.

The MOTION PREVAILED; THE POLICY ON TUITION REIMBURSEMENT (P1) WAS ADOPTED.

Rep. Paulsen moved the R4 resolution.

Paul Schweizer explained the R4 resolution.

Rep. Paulsen renewed his motion that the R4 resolution be adopted.

The <u>MOTION PREVAILED</u>; <u>THE RESOLUTION ON MEMBER'S PERSONALIZED</u> <u>STATIONERY ALLOCATION (R4) WAS ADOPTED</u>.

The sixth matter under consideration was the Resolution on Postage (R5).

Rep. Kohls moved the R5 resolution.

Paul Schweizer explained the R5 resolution.

Discussion.

Rep. Kohls renewed his motion that the R5 resolution be adopted.

The MOTION PREVAILED; THE RESOLUTION ON POSTAGE (R5) WAS ADOPTED.

The seventh matter under consideration was the Resolution on Reimbursement of Member Communications Expenses (R6).

Rep. Paulsen moved the R6 resolution.

Paul Schweizer explained the R6 resolution.

Rep. Paulsen renewed his motion that the R6 resolution be adopted.

The MOTION PREVAILED; THE RESOLUTION ON REIMBURSEMENT OF MEMBER COMMUNICATIONS EXPENSES (R6) WAS ADOPTED.

The eighth matter under consideration was the Resolution on Expense Reimbursement (R3).

Rep. Seifert moved the (R3) resolution with the exception of the language on page 2, lines 9 through 12.

Paul Schweizer explained the R3 resolution.

Discussion.

Rep. Seifert renewed his motion that the R3 resolution be adopted as modified.

The <u>MOTION PREVAILED</u>; THE RESOLUTION ON EXPENSE REIMBURSEMENT WAS ADOPTED AS MODIFIED.

The ninth matter under consideration was the Resolution on Expense Reimbursement (R3).

Rep. Juhnke offered the R3 resolution, page 2, lines 9-12.

Tom Todd offered the following technical amendment. On page 2, line 9, delete "PROVIDED FURTHER" and insert "BE IT RESOLVED, by the Committee on Rules and Legislative Administration".

Paul Schweizer explained the R3 resolution, page 2, lines 9-12.

Rep. Juhnke renewed his motion that the R3 resolution, page 2, lines 9 through 12, be adopted as modified.

The MOTION PREVAILED; THE RESOLUTION ON EXPENSE REIMBURSEMENT, PAGE 2, LINES 9 THROUGH 12, WAS ADOPTED AS MODIFIED.

The tenth matter under consideration was the Resolution on Administration of High School Page Program (R7).

Rep. Paulsen moved the R7 resolution.

Paul Schweizer explained the R7 resolution.

Rep. Paulsen renewed his motion that the R7 resolution be adopted.

The <u>MOTION PREVAILED</u>; THE RESOLUTION ON ADMINISTRATION OF HIGH SCHOOL PAGE PROGRAM (R7) WAS ADOPTED.

The eleventh matter under consideration was the Resolution on Photographic Equipment Usage Credit (R8).

Rep. Ozment moved the R8 resolution.

Paul Schweizer explained the R8 resolution, recommending a change to line 6. Delete "full-time" prior to the word "permanent".

Rep. Ozment renewed his motion that the R8 resolution be adopted as modified.

The <u>MOTION PREVAILED</u>; THE RESOLUTION ON PHOTOGRAPHIC EQUIPMENT <u>USAGE CREDIT WAS ADOPTED AS MODIFIED</u>.

The twelfth matter under consideration was the Miscellaneous Personnel Report.

Kelly Knight presented the Miscellaneous Personnel Report.

Rep. Paulsen moved that the Miscellaneous Personnel Report be approved.

The MOTION PREVAILED; THE MISCELLANEOUS PERSONNEL REPORT WAS APPROVED.

The meeting was adjourned at 10:15 A.M.

COMMITTEE ON RULES AND LEGISLATIVE ADMINISTRATION

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3 Resolution on Expense Reimbursement

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BE IT RESOLVED, by the Committee on Rules and Legislative Administration, that the House Controller is authorized and directed to prepare and issue warrants in payment of living expenses to each member of the House each calendar day of the sessions of the 84th Legislature.

PROVIDED FURTHER, that each member of the House who moves from his or her usual place of lodging for a substantial part of the sessions of the 84th Legislature may be reimbursed up to \$1,200 per month for the member's actual lodging expenses during the sessions of the 84th Legislature. The term "lodging expenses" includes, in addition to rent, the following lodging-related expenses at the place of lodging: furniture rental, local telephone service, utilities, renter's insurance, unrefundable fees, and parking. A member who is eligible for the monthly lodging reimbursement and who enters into a lodging contract covering a six-month period for the purpose of attending the 2005 regular session is eligible to receive the monthly lodging reimbursement for up to six months during the period beginning December 1, 2004, and ending June 30, 2005. For the purpose of attending the 2006 regular session, the member is eligible to receive the monthly lodging reimbursement during the period beginning January 1, 2006 and ending at the end of the month in which the legislature adjourns sine die. Each member requesting reimbursement must file the member's housing contract with House Administrative Services and must include a receipt or other verification of payment, with each monthly request for reimbursement. Each member requesting the lodging reimbursement must certify in writing to the House Controller, before the issuance of the first monthly warrant for each of the sessions of the 84th Legislature, that he or she has moved from the usual place of lodging and is eligible for the lodging reimbursement authorized by this resolution.

A member who receives the monthly lodging reimbursement during the sessions, and who chooses to pay personally to maintain the member's leased lodging in the vicinity of the Capitol during the interims, may receive reimbursement for the expense of the lodging during the interims when the member is at the Capitol overnight to conduct business authorized and approved under the rules committee's Policy on the Payment of Per Diem Living Expenses

During Interims. The amount of the reimbursement per night is the maximum monthly lodging reimbursement allowed by this resolution divided by 21.

During the sessions of the 84th Legislature, a member may be reimbursed for the expense of overnight lodging in the vicinity of the Capitol Complex on a night when the member is required to remain at the Capitol Complex to conduct legislative business or for reasons of safety. The reimbursement may not exceed \$95.00 per night. The reimbursement request must be in writing, accompanied by a receipt or other verification of payment, and approved by the Speaker.

PROVIDED FURTHER, that each member of the House who moves from his or her usual place of residence for the sessions of the 84th Legislature or whose home is 50 miles or more from the State Capitol may be reimbursed for travel to and from the member's place of residence at the same rate per mile as the standard federal mileage rate. Each member of the House who resides more than 125 miles from the State Capitol may be reimbursed for the actual expense of air travel between his or her place of residence and the State Capitol instead of actual mileage for the travel, upon presentation of a voucher. If the member travels in a personal aircraft, the travel reimbursement may not exceed the amount of reimbursement that would be payable for the trip by automobile. During sessions, a qualifying member is entitled to this reimbursement upon request, not to exceed one round trip per week of a regular or special session. During interims, this reimbursement is available to a qualifying member only for business at the Capitol authorized and approved under the rules committee's Policy on the Payment of Per Diem Living Expenses During Interims.

PROVIDED FURTHER, that when a member or employee is authorized to travel within the state on legislative business and official duties of the office, reimbursement for lodging may not exceed \$95.00 per night. However, when members or employees are attending a meeting or conference within the state, they may be reimbursed up to \$110.00 per night at the site of the meeting or conference.

PROVIDED FURTHER, that during the 2005 and 2006 interims of the 84th Legislature each member of the House may receive, upon written request, a travel allowance for travel within the member's legislative district, based upon the actual size of the district. The allowance

1	must be computed at the standard federal mileage rate per square mile per month, with a
2	minimum allowance of \$75.00 and a maximum allowance of \$650.00 per month.
3	PROVIDED FURTHER, that during the 2005 and 2006 sessions and during the interims
4	of the 84th Legislature, the Speaker's advance approval is required for per diem and
5	reimbursement of expenses for all out-of-state travel by a member or employee.
6	PROVIDED FURTHER, that during the 2005 and 2006 interims, a member of the House
7	who is traveling away from the member's home to conduct business authorized and approved
8	under the rules committee's Policy on the Payment of Per Diem Living Expenses During
9	Interims may be reimbursed for actual expenses in the same manner as House employees, except
10	as otherwise provided in this resolution. During the sessions of the 84 th Legislature, a member
11	may be reimbursed for actual expenses for authorized travel on legislative business away from
12	the Capitol in the same manner as House employees, except as otherwise provided in this
13	resolution. The manner of authorization is as provided in the Policy on the Payment of Per Diem
14	Living Expenses During Interims. The reimbursement is in addition to per diem expense
15	allowances.
16	PROVIDED FURTHER, that during sessions and interims, a member may not receive
17	reimbursement for food expenses on any day that the member receives per diem. If the House
18	provides or pays for a meal for the member, the cost of the meal must be deducted from the per
19	diem paid to the member.
20	PROVIDED FURTHER, that the members and members-elect who attended freshman
21	orientation, organizational caucuses and retreats, legislative orientation programs, and caucus
22	personnel committee meetings held in preparation for the 84th Legislative Session must be
23	reimbursed, upon request, in the same manner and in the same amounts as legislators who
24	attended interim meetings of legislative committees during the 83 rd Session.
