Graham Knaus serves as the CEO for the California State Association of Counties (CSAC), representing California's 58 counties and their 296 elected Supervisors. Prior to his current role, Graham was the Deputy Executive Director of Operations and Member Services for CSAC. In this role, he was responsible for internal operations, communications, member services and strategic planning. During this time, Graham also served as CEO of the California Counties Foundation, where he had previously been a faculty member for several years. The California Counties Foundation oversees the CSAC Institute and the Results First Initiative for evidence-based criminal justice.

Julie Ring has dedicated her career to public service, with nearly 30 years of experience in program management, public policy, advocacy and executive leadership. Appointed Executive Director of the Association of Minnesota Counties (AMC) in 2013, Julie previously served as Legislative Coordinator, Health & Human Services Policy Analyst, and the Local Public Health Association director at AMC. Prior to joining AMC, she worked for 10 years at the Minnesota Department of Health in a variety of positions focused on grant and contract management, legislative policy and local public health system development. Ms. Ring began her career as a grant writer in an economic development district in rural South



Dakota. She has a Bachelor of Arts in economics and political science from the University of Minnesota-Morris. Julie enjoys reading, gardening and exploring the state of Minnesota with her husband and her dog.



Dr. Dell Gines is a nonprofit executive and certified economic developer with over 15 years of experience in organizational transformation and economic development. He currently serves as the Chief Innovation Officer for the International Economic Development Council (IEDC). In this role, Dr. Gines oversees key initiatives, including the \$30 million Economic Recovery Corps program, aimed at promoting equitable growth nationwide. With a rich background at the Federal Reserve Bank of Kansas City and a portfolio of influential publications, Dr. Gines is a recognized thought leader in fostering economic resilience and inclusivity in distressed urban and rural communities.

Eric Bryson serves as Executive Director for the Montana Association of Counties. Mr. Bryson's public service career began while serving as a youth probation officer, when he became upset at the local school board and ran for office as a school board trustee. Having no stake in the educational system as a childless husband, he found himself in a crowded five-way race receiving the second most votes. Unluckily for the District, there were two seats open and he served his term without distinction. Then he became frustrated with city politics and ran for the City Commission. He won, and continued his public service without distinction. Eventually, Mr. Bryson left Bozeman and Gallatin County to return to his roots in the state capital of

Helena. Serving without distinction as the Lewis and Clark County Administrator led him to a transitional role in the Montana Association of Counties. After several unsuccessful recruitments, he ended up being the only applicant for the Executive Director position and has served without distinction since 2018.
