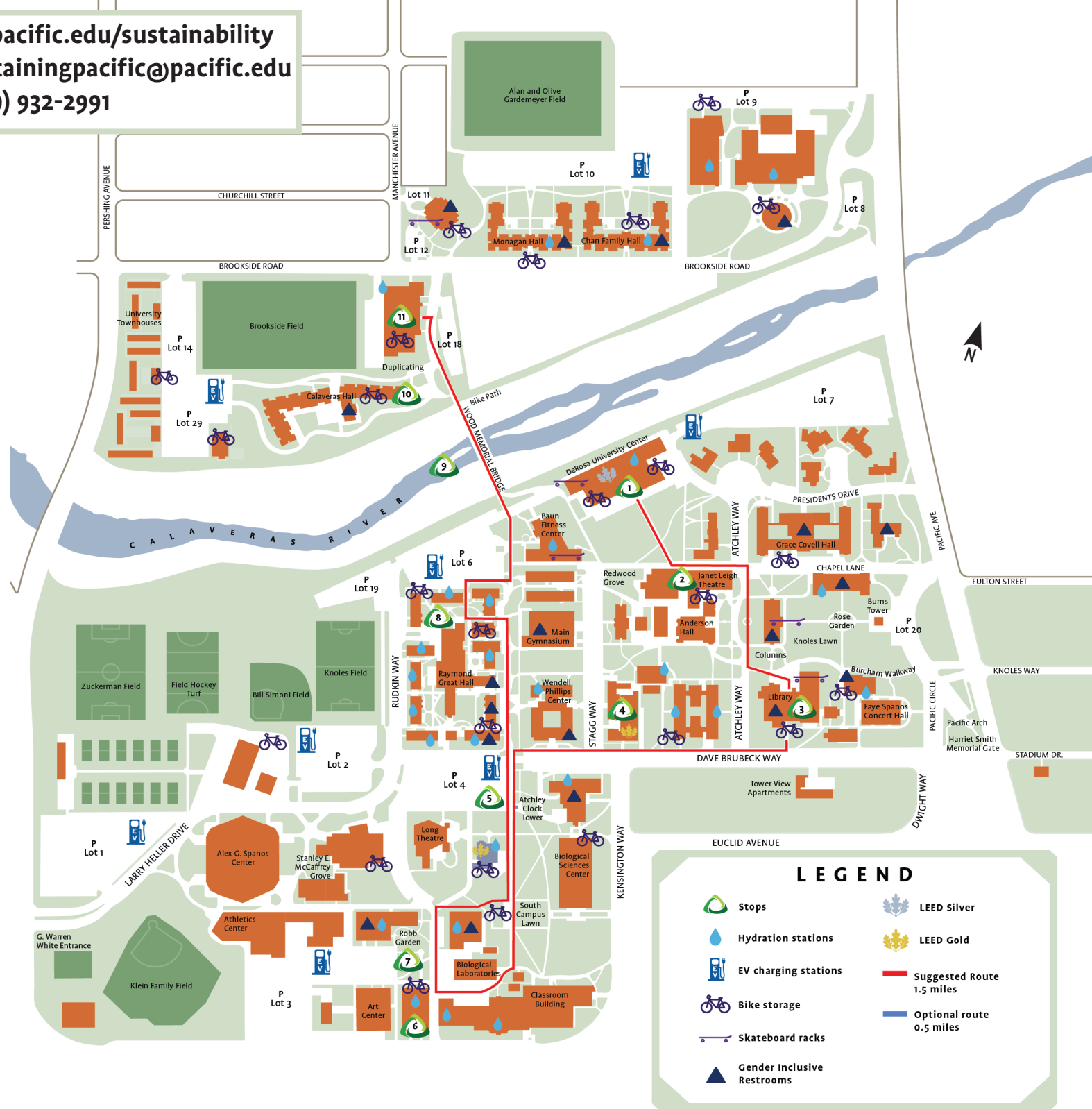
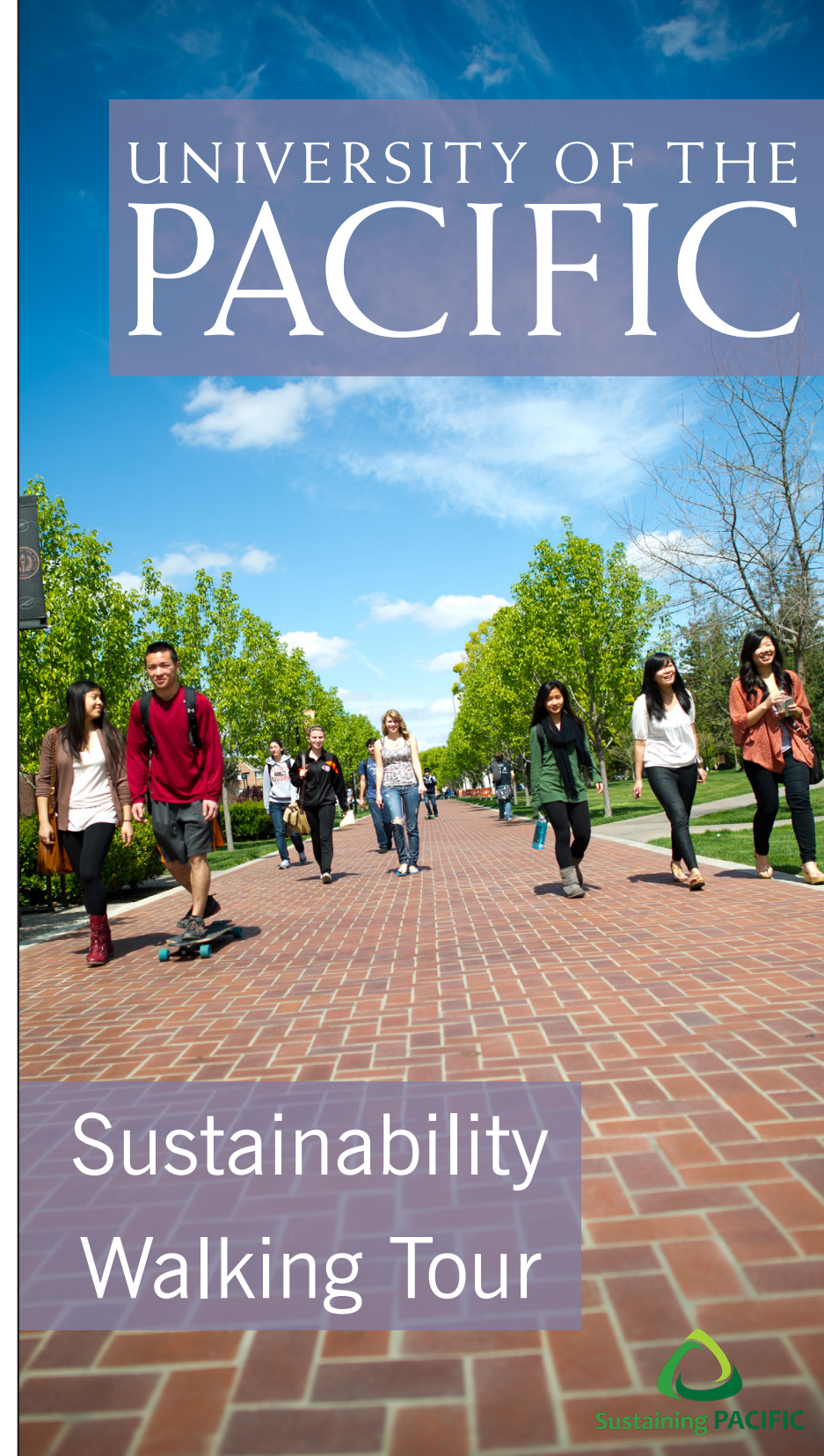

Sustainability Walking Tour



1 DeRosa University Center

This is one of three LEED® certified buildings on campus. Bon Appétit, Pacific's food service vendor, has put forth multiple sustainability initiatives, going straw-free, Farm-to-Fork, and using compostable serviceware. The Tiger To-Go program offers reusable clamshells for to-go meals, helping reduce waste and save Pacificans money.

2 Hand Hall & McCaffrey

Hand Hall holds administrative offices for College Corps, an AmeriCorps program in which students work 15 hours a week with a community partner in the areas of food security, climate action and community health. McCaffrey hosts many Student Life programs vital to student development so that students of all identities feel empowerment and belonging. Having support structures to help level the playing field for people from frequently marginalized or low-income groups is a major component of sustainability.

3 William Knox Holt Memorial Library

The Muir Experience in the lobby of the Library is designed to follow John Muir's ideas from germination to sharing them with the world. Holt-Atherton collections holds the largest collection of John Muir's original writings. The Cube is a space to create; they have equipment and people to teach you to use it. There are plenty of opportunities to fix or upcycle with engravers, sewing machines and more.

4 Chambers Technology

The School of Engineering and Computer Science offers the sustainability minor, available to all students. Chambers is also a LEED certified building.

5 Solar & Transportation

About 30% of this campus's electricity is generated from solar. There are 16 electric vehicle charging stations across campus. Dibs is an online service that connects commuters with potential carpools, provides resources for bicycle commuters and offers a free emergency ride home service. The Stockton Mobility Collective has bike and carshare sites; Pacific hosts a bikeshare site.

6 Bon Appétit Native Plant & Rock Garden

This garden showcases California native plants and rock specimens (mostly from northern California). These plants grow well in the Central Valley, typically require less water than ornamentals and support native wildlife. Pacific faculty selected the original 70+ plant varieties and rock samples.

7 Ted and Chris Robb Garden & Food Resource Center

The Ted and Chris Robb Garden offers opportunities for students, staff, faculty, and the Stockton community to learn how to garden more sustainably. Produce is grown using Grow Biointensive principles. The garden is open weekdays for all to walk through. If you see a gardener feel free to ask them questions! The Food Resource Center in Communications Room 10 is home to garden offices, learning space, resources and the Pacific Food Pantry.



8 Muir Botanic Area

This area is full of flora mentioned in John Muir's writings. It was designed in coordination with Jeannette Powell as a collaborative space for Powell Scholars in 2011, and transformed underutilized, high-maintenance lawn to greenspace connecting Pacificans to Muir's legacy.

9 Calaveras River

Prior to the first contact with outsiders in the late 1700s, Native Americans had a peaceful and abundant life along the waterway. A large village was formally in this area, inhabited by various Yokut tribelets, including the Passasimas and Nototomne.

10 Kitchen Co-op

All Pacificans can rent this fully equipped kitchen and gathering space. The Co-op was established in 2014 and is now a collaborative program under Sustaining Pacific and Residential Life & Housing.

11 Physical Plant & Mail Services

Many sustainability initiatives are developed and implemented by staff based in this building which houses Physical Plant, Construction Management and Sustainability. Sustaining Pacific works to promote sustainability in campus operations, practice and education. The mailroom is a collection point for many difficult to dispose of items. Small e-waste items, batteries, shipping materials, empty printer cartridges and documents in need of shredding may all be dropped here for safe disposal or reuse.
