














Age differences in issues, with three age groups

Age differences in issues by party, with three age groups






FIGURE A6Age differences in broader opinions of politics, with three age groups










Party by generational cohort and year

Ideology by cohort in the United States as a whole



Party by cohort in the United States as a whole






