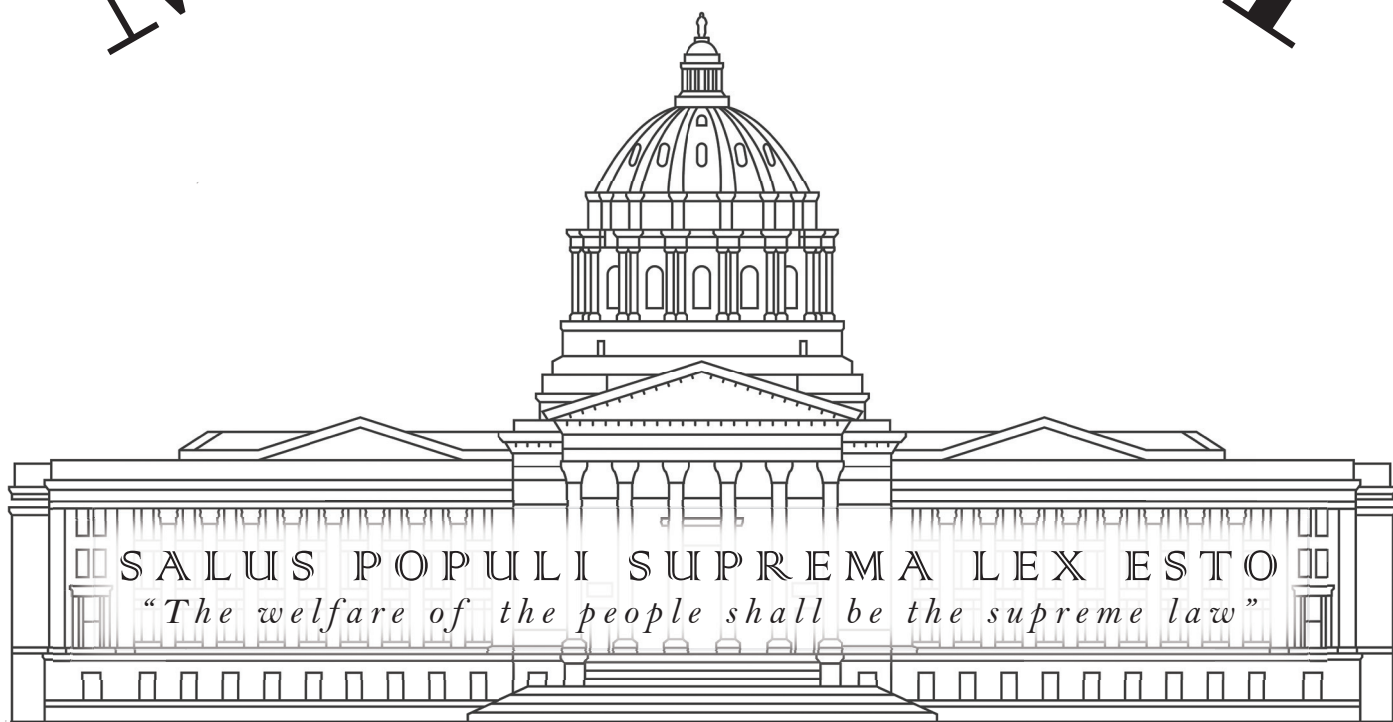

## HOW TO CITE RULES AND RSMO

### RULES

The rules are codified in the *Code of State Regulations* in this system–

and should be cited in this manner: 3 CSR 10-4.115.

Each department of state government is assigned a title. Each agency or division in the department is assigned a division number. The agency then groups its rules into general subject matter areas called chapters and specific areas called rules. Within a rule, the first breakdown is called a section and is designated as (1). Subsection is (A) with further breakdown into paragraphs 1., subparagraphs A., parts (I), subparts (a), items I. and subitems a.

The rule is properly cited by using the full citation; for example, 3 CSR 10-4.115, NOT Rule 10-4.115.

Citations of RSMo are to the *Missouri Revised Statutes* as of the date indicated.

Rules appearing under this heading are filed under the authority granted by section 536.025, RSMo. An emergency rule may be adopted by an agency if the agency finds that an immediate danger to the public health, safety, or welfare, or a compelling governmental interest requires emergency action; follows procedures best calculated to assure fairness to all interested persons and parties under the circumstances; follows procedures which comply with the protections extended by the Missouri and the United States Constitutions; limits the scope of such rule to the circumstances creating an emergency and requiring emergency procedure, and at the time of or prior to the adoption of such rule files with the secretary of state the text of the rule together with the specific facts, reasons, and findings which support its conclusion that there is an immediate danger to the public health, safety, or welfare which can be met only through the adoption of such rule and its reasons for concluding that the procedure employed is fair to all interested persons and parties under the circumstances.

Rules filed as emergency rules may be effective not less than ten (10) business days after filing or at such later date as may be specified in the rule and may be terminated at any time by the state agency by filing an order with the secretary of state fixing the date of such termination, which order shall be published by the secretary of state in the Missouri Register as soon as practicable.

All emergency rules must state the period during which they are in effect, and in no case can they be in effect more than one hundred eighty (180) calendar days or thirty (30) legislative days, whichever period is longer. Emergency rules are not renewable, although an agency may at any time adopt an identical rule under the normal rulemaking procedures.

**EMERGENCY AMENDMENT**

**11 CSR 70-2.010 Definitions.** The Division of Alcohol and Tobacco Control is adding a section (30).

*PURPOSE: This amendment clarifies the Division’s longstanding practice of treating legal entities the same way corporations are treated in evaluating their qualifications for licensure.*

*EMERGENCY STATEMENT: This emergency amendment informs applicants for a liquor license that all business entity types can be “persons” capable of obtaining a liquor license under sections 311.030 and 311.050, RSMo. This emergency amendment is necessary to protect a compelling governmental interest in that a recent Administrative Hearing Commission decision (Case Numbers 23-0288 and 23-0439) determined “a single member LLC, does not come within the definition of a “person”” to be licensed. This holding, if adopted by a court of precedent, would*

*mean fifty-four percent (54.3%) nine thousand two hundred eighty-eight of the seventeen thousand ninety-five (9,288 of the 17,095) primary licenses issued by the division would be unlawful and cannot be renewed next year. As a result, the division finds a compelling governmental interest, which requires this emergency action. The scope of this emergency rule is limited to the circumstances creating the emergency and complies with the protections extended in the Missouri and United States Constitutions. The division believes this emergency amendment is fair to all interested persons and parties under the circumstances. This emergency amendment was filed March 22, 2024, becomes effective April 5, 2024, and expires January 15, 2025.*

**(30) Association, as it is used in section 311.030, RSMo, includes all business entities not otherwise described in Chapter 311 as a person.**

**EMERGENCY AMENDMENT**

**11 CSR 70-2.020 Application for License.** The division of Alcohol and Tobacco Control is adding a section (18).

*PURPOSE: This amendment clarifies the Division’s longstanding practice of treating legal entities the same way corporations are treated in evaluating their qualifications for licensure.*

*EMERGENCY STATEMENT: This emergency amendment informs applicants for a liquor license that the Division of Alcohol and Tobacco Control will use the guidelines set out in section 311.060, RSMo, to determine the qualifications of all legal entities applying for a liquor license. This emergency amendment is necessary to protect a compelling governmental interest in that a recent Administrative Hearing Commission decision (Case Numbers 23-0288 and 23-0439) would force the division to make arbitrary distinctions between corporations and all other applicants for a liquor license. Further, the decision would require the division to change its decades-long practice of treating all legal entities the same way as it treats corporations in determining who is qualified for a license. As a result, the division finds a compelling governmental interest, which requires this emergency action. The scope of this emergency amendment is limited to the circumstances creating the emergency and complies with the protections extended in the Missouri and United States Constitutions. The division believes this emergency amendment is fair to all interested persons and parties under the circumstances.*

*This emergency amendment was filed March 22, 2024, becomes effective April 5, 2024, and expires January 15, 2025.*

**(18) When evaluating the qualifications for licensure of any business entity not specifically named in section 311.060, RSMo, the division shall use the standards for a corporation described therein.**

**(A) No entity shall be granted a liquor license if any of its owners, natural persons holding a financial interest in the business sought to be licensed, officers, or managing officer have held any such a position with a revoked license, subject to the limitations described in section 311.060.7, RSMo, or if such individual shall not be a person of good moral character.**

**(B) This section shall not apply to trusts.**

The text of proposed rules and changes will appear under this heading. A notice of proposed rulemaking is required to contain an explanation of any new rule or any change in an existing rule and the reasons therefor. This explanation is set out in the PURPOSE section of each rule. A citation of the legal authority to make rules is also required, and appears following the text of the rule, after the word "Authority."

Entirely new rules are printed without any special symbology under the heading of proposed rule. If an existing rule is to be amended or rescinded, it will have a heading of proposed amendment or proposed rescission. Rules that are proposed to be amended will have new matter printed in boldface type and matter to be deleted placed in brackets.

An important function of the *Missouri Register* is to solicit and encourage public participation in the rulemaking process. The law provides that for every proposed rule, amendment, or rescission there must be a notice that anyone may comment on the proposed action. This comment may take different forms.

If an agency is required by statute to hold a public hearing before making any new rules, then a Notice of Public Hearing will appear following the text of the rule. Hearing dates must be at least thirty (30) days after publication of the notice in the *Missouri Register*. If no hearing is planned or required, the agency must give a Notice to Submit Comments. This allows anyone to file statements in support of or in opposition to the proposed action with the agency within a specified time, no less than thirty (30) days after publication of the notice in the *Missouri Register*.

An agency may hold a public hearing on a rule even though not required by law to hold one. If an agency allows comments to be received following the hearing date, the close-of-comments date will be used as the beginning day in the ninety- (90-) day count necessary for the filing of the order of rulemaking.

If an agency decides to hold a public hearing after planning not to, it must withdraw the earlier notice, file a new notice of proposed rulemaking, and schedule a hearing for a date not less than thirty (30) days from the date of publication of the new notice.

#### Chapter 36 – Egg Quality Program

#### PROPOSED RULE

##### 2 CSR 90-36.005 Definitions

*PURPOSE: This rule establishes definitions of words or terms (except in those instances where the context clearly indicates otherwise) used in the regulations of this chapter as required by section 196.354, RSMo.*

(1) "Check" means any individual egg that has a broken shell or crack in the shell but with its shell membranes intact and its contents do not leak. A "check" is lower in quality than a "dirty."

(2) "Consumer" means any person who purchases eggs for such person's own family use or consumption; or any restaurant, hotel, boardinghouse, bakery, or other institution or concern which purchases eggs for serving to guests or patrons thereof, or for its own use in cooking, baking, or manufacturing their products.

(3) "Container" means any box, case, basket, carton, sack, bag, or other receptacle.

(4) "Dealer" means any person who purchases eggs from the producers thereof, or another dealer, for the purpose of selling such eggs to another dealer, a processor, or retailer.

(5) "Denatured" means eggs –

(A) Made unfit for human food by treatment or the addition of a foreign substance; or

(B) With one-half (1/2) or more of the shell's surface covered by a permanent black, dark purple, or dark blue dye.

(6) "Director" means the director of the Department of Agriculture.

(7) "Dirty" or "dirt" means an egg that has a shell that is unbroken and has adhering dirt or foreign material.

(8) "Eggs" means the shell eggs of a domesticated chicken, turkey, duck, quail, goose, or guinea that are intended for human consumption.

(9) "Inedible eggs" means eggs which are defined as such in the rules and regulations of the director adopted under sections 196.311 to 196.361, RSMo, which definition shall conform to the specifications adopted therefor by the United States Department of Agriculture.

(10) "Leaker" means an individual egg that has a crack or break in the shell and shell membranes to the extent that the egg contents are exuding or free to exude through the shell.

(11) "Loss" means an egg that is inedible, cooked, frozen, contaminated, musty, or moldy, or an egg that contains a large blood spot, large meat spot, bloody white, green white, rot, sour eggs, stuck yolk, blood ring, embryo chick (at or beyond the blood ring state), free yolk in the white, or other foreign material, or an egg that is adulterated as such term is defined pursuant to the Federal Food, Drug, and Cosmetic Act.

(12) "Person" means and includes any individual, firm, partnership, exchange, association, trustee, receiver, corporation, or any other business organization, and any member, officer, or employee thereof.

(13) "Processor" means any person engaged in breaking eggs or manufacturing or processing egg liquids, whole egg meats, yolks, whites, or any mixture of yolks and whites, with or without the addition of other ingredients, whether chilled, frozen, condensed, concentrated, dried, powdered or desiccated.

(14) "Retailer" means any person who sells eggs to a consumer.

(15) "Sell" means offer for sale, expose for sale, have in possession for sale, exchange, barter, or trade.

(16) "Subcontainer" means any container when being used

within another container.

**PROPOSED AMENDMENT**

**2 CSR 90-36.010 Egg Inspection and Enforcement** [of Missouri Egg Laws]. The department is amending the title and section (1).

*PURPOSE:* This amendment incorporates by reference the United States Standards, Grades, and Weight Classes for Shell Eggs and removes general terms in subsection (1)(A) and adds clearer language in new subsection (1)(A) along with a chart describing case requirements.

(1) Shell eggs shall meet the standards as [published] **incorporated by reference** in the United States Standards, Grades, and Weight Classes for Shell Eggs, AMS 56 [(July 20, 2000 or its revision)] **published by the United State Department of Agriculture, dated July 20, 2000. This rule does not incorporate any subsequent amendments or additions.** This document is available on the internet at [www.ams.usda.gov/poultry](http://www.ams.usda.gov/poultry) under Publications or by writing to USDA, AMS, Poultry Programs Stop 0259, Room 3944 South 1400 Independence Ave, SW Washington, DC 20250-0259.

**[(A) General Terms.**

1. **Denatured Eggs**—Eggs unfit for human food may be sold or delivered to any dealer as inedible eggs, provided the shells of such eggs have been completely broken or crushed and the mixture of shell and egg meats has been denatured with any denaturing agent approved by the director of the Department of Agriculture and used in sufficient quantities to be easily detected by sight or smell.

2. **Loss**—An egg that is inedible, cooked, frozen, contaminated, musty, or moldy, or an egg that contains a large blood spot, large meat spot, bloody white, green white, rot, sour eggs, stuck yolk, blood ring, embryo chick (at or beyond the blood ring state), free yolk in the white, or other foreign material, or an egg that is adulterated as such term is defined pursuant to the Federal Food, Drug, and Cosmetic Act.

3. **Leaker**—An individual egg that has a crack or break

in the shell and shell membranes to the extent that the egg contents are exuding or free to exude through the shell.

4. **Check**—An individual egg that has a broken shell or crack in the shell but with its shell membranes intact and its contents do not leak. A “check” is considered to be lower in quality than a “dirty.”]

**[(B)](A) Basis of Grading Service (Sampling).**

1. Any grading service in accordance with the regulations in this part shall be for class, quality, quantity, or condition or any combination thereof. Grading service with respect to the determination of the quality of products shall be **[on the basis of] incorporated by reference to** the United States Standards, Grades, and Weights Classes. However, grading service may be rendered with respect to products which are bought and sold **[on the basis of] based on** institutional contract specifications or specifications of the applicant and such service, when approved by the administrator, shall be rendered on the basis of such specifications. The supervision of packaging shall be in accordance with such instructions as may be approved or issued by the administrator.

2. Whenever grading service is performed on a representative sample basis[,]; such sample shall be drawn and consist of not less than the minimum number of cases as indicated in the following table. *[A minimum of one hundred (100) eggs shall be examined per sample case. For lots which consist of less than one (1) case, a minimum of fifty (50) eggs shall be examined. If the lot consists of less than fifty (50) eggs, all eggs will be examined.*

Minimum Number of Cases Comprising a Representative Sample

*For each additional fifty (50) cases, or fraction thereof, in excess of six hundred (600) cases, one (1) additional case shall be included in the sample.]*

<b>Less than 1 case (38 dozen)</b>	<b>50 eggs must be examined, if less than 50, all eggs examined in lot.</b>
<b>1 case and above</b>	<b>100 eggs must be examined per sample case. For each additional 50 cases or fraction thereof.</b>
<b>For each additional fifty (50) cases, or fraction thereof, more than six hundred (600) cases, one (1) additional case shall be included in the sample.</b>

**PROPOSED RULE**

**2 CSR 90-36.015 Egg License Requirements**

*PURPOSE: This rule establishes license requirements, enforcement actions, and license fees for retailers, dealers, and processors.*

(1) All persons engaged in buying, selling, trading, or trafficking in, or processing eggs is required to be licensed except –

(A) Those who sell only eggs produced by their own flocks, provided such eggs are not sold at an established place of business away from the premises of such producer;

(B) Hatcheries that purchase eggs used exclusively for hatching purposes;

(C) Hotels, restaurants, and other public eating places where all eggs purchased are served in the establishment; and

(D) Bakeries, confectioneries, and ice cream manufacturers purchasing eggs for use and used only in the manufacture of their products.

(2) A “retailer’s license” is required for any person selling eggs to a consumer. Along with an application and fee, a “No Tax Due” letter from the Missouri Department of Revenue must accompany application for license and must be provided each year upon renewal.

(3) A “dealer’s license” is required for any person who buys eggs from a producer or other dealer(s) to resell to other dealers, processors, or retailers.

(4) A “processor’s license” is required for any person who is engaged in breaking eggs or manufacturing or processing eggs into liquid, whole egg meats, yolks, whites, or any mixture without the addition of ingredients, whether chilled, frozen, concentrated, dried, powdered, or desiccated.

(5) The director of agriculture shall have the authority to assess egg licensing fees to assist in defraying operating expenses.

The license fees are as follows:

License Type	Fee
Egg Licensing Fee – R2-Retailer	\$25
Egg Licensing Fee – R1-Retailer: Sells at farmers markets or roadside stand	\$25
Egg Licensing Fee – Dealer-D1:0-100 cases	\$40
Egg Licensing Fee – Dealer-D4:Over 100 cases	\$50
Egg Licensing Fee – Processor-P1:0-250 cases	\$60
Egg Licensing Fee – Processor P3: 250-1000 cases	\$75
Egg Licensing Fee – Processor-P4:Over 1000 cases	\$100

(6) All licenses shall be conspicuously posted in the place of business to which it applies. The license year shall be twelve (12) months, or any fraction thereof, beginning July 1 and ending June 30.

(7) No license shall be transferable, but it may be moved from one place to another by the consent of the director.

(8) All moneys received from license fees collected hereunder shall be deposited in the state treasury to the credit of the agriculture protection fund created in section 261.200, RSMo.

(9) The director may suspend or revoke the license of any dealer, processor, or retailer, or refuse to issue a license to any applicant. After a public hearing, if it is found that such dealer, processor, retailer, or applicant has violated any of the provisions of sections 196.311 to 196.361, RSMo, any such dealer, processor, retailer, or applicant shall have full rights to have counsel, to produce witnesses in his behalf at such hearing, and to have ten (10) days notice in writing of the date, time, and place of such hearing, and the charges and grounds upon which the license is sought to be revoked or suspended, or to be refused a license. The order of suspension, revocation, or refusal to issue a license shall not become final until ten (10) days after the date thereof, and after the party to the proceeding has been notified in writing of the action of the director. Any party to the proceedings that is aggrieved by any final decision or order of the director may appeal such order in the manner provided for such appeals in the Administrative Procedure Act of Missouri (Chapter 536).

(1) Terms beginning with the letter A.

(F) Apprentice means any person who has been issued an apprentice permit who, under the supervision of a permitted *[nonrestricted]* **non-restricted** well or pump installation *[contractor]* **contractor**, is obtaining the knowledge, skills, and abilities necessary to apply for a non-restricted permit.

(I) Augered well means a well that is drilled by the rotation of a *[cylindrical tool]* **helical drill bit**.

(4) Terms beginning with the letter D.

(F) Domestic well means a private water supply well equipped with a pump that does not have the capacity to produce seventy *[(70) gallons or more of water per minute]* **gallons per minute (70 gpm) or more** at the surface and that has three (3) or *[less]* **fewer** service connections. A domestic well is not limited to residential usage.

(8) Terms beginning with the letter H.

(B) High yield *[bedrock]* well means a water supply well *[drilled into bedrock aquifers]* that is equipped with a pump that has the capacity to produce seventy *[(70) or more gallons of water per minute]* **gallons per minute (70 gpm) or more of water** to the surface and does not supply water to a public water system. These wells are also subject to major water user reporting requirements pursuant to sections 256.400–256.433, RSMo.

*[(C) High yield unconsolidated material well means a water supply well drilled into alluvial or glacial drift aquifers and is equipped with a pump that has the capacity to produce seventy (70) or more gallons of water per minute and does not supply water to a public water system. These wells are also subject to major water user reporting requirements pursuant to sections 256.400–256.433, RSMo.]*

(13) Terms beginning with the letter M.

(E) Multifamily well means a well that *[has no more than eight (8) connections, has a pumping capacity of less than seventy gallons per minute (<70 gpm), and serves fewer than twenty five (25) individuals on average]* **is equipped with a pump that does not have the capacity to produce seventy gallons per minute (<70 gpm) at the surface, has more than three (3) service connections, and does not supply water to a public water system as defined in section 640.102, RSMo.** A multifamily well may be used to serve a charitable or benevolent organization pursuant to section 640.116, RSMo.

(14) Terms beginning with the letter N.

*[(C) Nontransient noncommunity water system means a public water system as defined in 10 CSR 60-2.]*

(15) Terms beginning with the letter O.

(F) Ozark Confining Unit means low permeability bedrock that includes the Northview Formation, *[the]* **and** Chattanooga Shale *[, and the upper thirty feet (30') of the Cotter Dolomite]* that serves as a natural barrier to groundwater mixing between the upper and lower aquifer.

(19) Terms beginning with the letter S.

(L) State of disrepair means a well that is unable to produce water to the ground surface or transport water to a point of use or poses a contamination risk to the groundwater. It does not mean a well that is waiting for pump installation or a well that has been approved by the department for temporary dormancy. See Inactive Well 10 CSR 23-1.010(9)[(A)](B).

(20) Terms beginning with the letter T.

(A) Temporary monitoring well means [a] **any** monitoring well [used for field screening purposes] that is plugged within thirty (30) days of [being installed] **completion**.

[(C)] *Transient noncommunity water system means a public water system as defined in 10 CSR 60-2.]*

[(D)](C) Tremie pipe means a conductor pipe, hose, or tubing used in the down hole placement of grout.

[(E)](D) Tremie grouting method means the process in which a small diameter pipe is inserted in the annular space or borehole to the depth of the zone to be sealed and grout is emplaced through the tremie pipe by gravity.

[(F)](E) Tremie pressure grouting method means the process in which a small diameter pipe is inserted in the annular space or borehole to the depth of the zone to be sealed and grout is emplaced by pumping with a grout pump from the bottom to the top of the zone to be sealed.

[(2)] *To register vehicles and machines, a complete vehicle registration shall be submitted along with the appropriate fee pursuant to 10 CSR 23-2.010. A registration card will be issued for each vehicle and machine and shall be carried in each vehicle and machine at all times and be subject to inspection by the department. The card expires one (1) year from the date of issue.]*

[(3)](2) Notice of a change in ownership or the purchase of a vehicle and/or machine shall be provided to the department within thirty (30) days and submit a new application form and the appropriate fee. *[A new vehicle or machine card will be issued.]*

[(4)](3) A permittee shall place in a conspicuous location on both sides of each vehicle or machine the words MO PERMIT and the permit numbers not less than three inches (3") high and one and one-half inches (1 1/2") wide in a contrasting color to the background of the vehicle or machine. Permit number shall be placed on the vehicle or machine within sixty (60) days of [receiving the] vehicle or machine registration [card].

**10 CSR 23-3.030 Standards for Construction of Water Wells.** The department is amending sections (1)–(5), adding a new section (5), and renumbering as necessary.

*PURPOSE: This amendment adds proper incorporation by reference to ASTM standards, increases well construction flexibilities and*



options in all drill areas, adds grouting subsection (3)(C), and adds a reference to community guidelines and non-community standards for public water wells.

**PUBLISHER'S NOTE:** The secretary of state has determined that the publication of the entire text of the material which is incorporated by reference as a portion of this rule would be unduly cumbersome or expensive. This material as incorporated by reference in this rule shall be maintained by the agency at its headquarters and shall be made available to the public for inspection and copying at no more than the actual cost of reproduction. This note applies only to the reference material. The entire text of the rule is printed here.

(1) Domestic Water Wells and Pilot Holes.

(A) Casing.

1. Steel well casing. The minimum standards for steel casing are found in Table 3.2.

A. Joints. Joints shall be welded or threaded and be watertight. Recessed or reamed and drifted couplings shall be used on threaded casing. Other couplings may be used provided the design, taper, and type of thread of the coupling matches that of the pipe. Casing extension material shall be of similar material to the original casing. Other types of joints or devices used to join dissimilar casing extension materials may be used upon receiving prior written approval from the department.

B. Standards. Casing shall be new [and meet American Society for Testing and Materials (ASTM), A53 grade A or B, A500 grade A or B, or A589 or other grade weldable new pipe having a quality equal to or greater than those specified. Used casing when salvaged within ninety (90) days of installation from a water supply well and is decontaminated is considered new pipe.], which includes used casing that was salvaged from a water supply well within ninety (90) days of installation and is decontaminated. Casing shall meet one (1) of the following requirements:

(I) Grade A or B of the American Society for Testing and Materials (ASTM) A53-A53M-20, *Standard Specifications for Pipe, Steel, Black and Hot-Dipped, Zinc-Coated, Welded and Seamless*. This standard is incorporated by reference as published July 15, 2020, by ASTM International, 100 Barr Harbor Drive, PO Box C700, West Conshohocken, PA 19428-2959 and does not incorporate any subsequent amendments or additions;

(II) Grade A or B of ASTM A500/A500M-21 *Standard Specification for Cold-Formed Welded and Seamless Carbon Steel Structural Tubing in Rounds and Shapes*. This standard

is incorporated by reference as published January 21, 2021, by ASTM International, 100 Barr Harbor Drive, PO Box C700, West Conshohocken, PA 19428-2959 and does not incorporate any subsequent amendments or additions;

(III) ASTM A589-A589M-06 *Standard Specification for Seamless and Welded Carbon Steel Water-Well Pipe*. This standard is incorporated by reference as published October 2, 2018, by ASTM International, 100 Barr Harbor Drive, PO Box C700, West Conshohocken, PA 19428-2959 and does not incorporate any subsequent amendments or additions; or

(IV) Any other new pipe having a quality equal to or greater than those specified above.

C. Drive shoe. [In areas where steel casing is required, equip the well casing with a drive shoe or similar protective device to prevent damage to the well casing during construction of the well. If no drive shoe is used, follow the minimum cure times in Table 3.3.]

(I) In areas where steel casing is required, equip the well casing with a drive shoe or similar protective device to prevent damage to the well casing during construction of the well.

(II) If no drive shoe is used, follow the minimum grout cure times in Table 3.3.

**D. Installation. Install and centralize casing within the borehole for even distribution of grout material.**

2. Plastic well casing. The minimum standards for plastic well casing are found in Table 3.4.

A. Joints. Well casing joints shall be watertight and joined by solvent weld (glued) or mechanical. Casing extension material shall be of similar material to the original casing. Other types of joints or devices used to join dissimilar casing extension materials may be used upon receiving prior written approval from the department.

B. Standards. Casing shall be new and meet ASTM [standards, composed of polyvinyl chloride (PVC) or acrylonitrile-butadiene-styrene (ABS) thermoplastics and meet ASTM standards, marked "Well Casing" and have the specification number F-480 Standard for Plastic Well Casing. Used casing when salvaged within ninety (90) days of installation from a water supply well and is decontaminated is considered new pipe] F480-14 *Standard Specification for Thermoplastic Well Casing Pipe and Couplings Made in*



**Standard Dimension Ratios (SDR), SCH 40 and SCH 80.** This standard is incorporated by reference as published March 1, 2014, by ASTM International, 100 Barr Harbor Drive, PO Box C700, West Conshohocken, PA 19428-2959 and does not incorporate any subsequent amendments or additions. Used casing is considered new when salvaged from a water supply well within ninety (90) days of installation and decontaminated.

C. Packers. A packer, coupling, or inverted bell shall be secured at the bottom of the casing and hold the grout in place while drilling continues. No packer, coupling, or inverted bell is needed if grout is allowed to cure following minimum cure times in Table 3.3.

**D. Installation. Casings shall be installed and centralized within the borehole for even distribution of grout material.**

3. Concrete and fiberglass well casing –

A. May be used for unconsolidated wells greater than eighteen inches (18") in diameter; *[and]*

B. Shall be composed of non-toxic durable material designed for use in potable water wells.; **and**

**C. Shall be installed and centralized within the borehole for even distribution of grout material.**

4. Other materials may be used upon receiving prior written approval from the department.

(C) Grouting. It is the responsibility of the well installation contractor to ensure that the annular space is sealed and that the casing does not leak. This responsibility ends three (3) years after the approval date by the department unless it can be proven that the annular seal has been damaged by other persons.

1. Grouting installation methods.

A. Gravity method.

(I) Bentonite granules or bentonite slurry shall not be poured through standing water greater than one hundred feet (>100').

(II) Table 3.5 states the maximum depth that grout can be gravity-fed into the well annulus.

(III) Gravity grouting greater than two hundred feet (200') in a four inch (4") annulus is not allowed.

B. Tremie method. Tremie pipes shall be –

(I) Placed into the annulus and extend to no less than five feet (5') from the bottom of the interval to be grouted;

(II) Gradually withdrawn as the grouting material is emplaced; and

(III) No greater than ten feet (10') above the emplaced grouting material during the entire grouting process.

C. Tremie pressure method. The tremie pipe shall remain submerged in the grouting material during the entire grout pumping process.

D. Pressure method.

E. Open-hole method.

(I) Non-slurry bentonite may be poured from the surface and allowed to completely hydrate before the casing is installed.

(II) Bentonite slurry may be used in wells with more than one hundred feet (>100') of standing water only if the grout is emplaced by one (1) of the tremie grouting methods.

F. Positive displacement method.

(I) Bentonite slurry or cement slurry may be used in wells with more than one hundred feet (>100') of standing water only if the grout is emplaced by one (1) of the tremie grouting methods.

G. Other grouting methods may be used upon receiving prior written approval from the department.

2. Grout materials.

A. Cement slurry.

B. Bentonite slurry.

C. Bentonite non-slurry. If there is no water in the annular space, the bentonite shall be hydrated.

D. Other grout types may be used upon receiving prior written approval from the department.

(D) Driving Casing.

1. When geologic conditions require the casing to be driven, the casing may be driven to the casing depth without adding grout.

**2. When it is necessary to drive multiple strings of smaller diameter casing through the primary casing, each succeeding smaller diameter casing shall extend into the preceding casing at least twenty feet (20').**

*[2.3.* Once the casing is set, install liner pursuant to 10 CSR 23-3.080(3)(C).

*[3.4.* In addition to the liner, a top annular casing seal, at least ten feet (10') deep is required below the pitless connection.

*[4.5.* A liner and top annular seal are not required when the open hole method or positive displacement grouting method is used.

(2) Multifamily Wells.

(C) Casing.

1. Follow 10 CSR 23-3.090 for minimum casing depths by Drilling Area for domestic water wells.

2. Install new *[steel casing that meets the minimum standards specified in Table 3.2 for size and weight] casing that meets the requirements listed in 10 CSR 23-3.030(1)(A)1. or new Standard Dimension Ratio 21, or SCH 80 plastic casing meeting the requirements of 10 CSR 23-3.030(1)(A)2.B.*

3. Other casing design or materials may be used upon receiving prior written approval from the department.

4. Liners are not a substitute for casing.

(D) Joints. *[Well casing joints shall be welded or threaded and be watertight. Other types of joints may be used upon receiving advanced written approval by the department. Recessed or reamed and drifted couplings shall be used on threaded casing; other couplings may be used provided the design, taper, and type of thread matches that of the pipe.]*

1. Steel well casing joints shall be welded or threaded and be watertight. Other types of joints may be used upon receiving advanced written approval by the department. Recessed or reamed and drifted couplings shall be used on threaded casing; other couplings may be used provided the design, taper, and thread type is compatible with the pipe.

2. Plastic well casing joints shall be watertight and joined by solvent weld (glued) or mechanically.

3. Casing extension material shall be of similar material to the original casing. Other types of joints or devices used to join dissimilar casing extension materials may be used upon receiving prior written approval from the department.

*[(E) Standards. Pipe shall be new and meet the ASTM, A53 grade A or B, A500 grade A or B, or A589 or other grade weldable new pipe having a quality equal to or greater than those specified. Used pipe is considered new if it is salvaged within ninety (90) days of installation from a new water well.]*

*[(F)](E) Drive shoe. [Equip the well casing with a drive shoe or similar protective device to prevent damage to the well casing during construction of the well] For drive shoe requirements see 10 CSR 23-3.030(1)(A)1.C.*

(F) Packers. For packer requirements see 10 CSR 23-3.030(1)(A)2.C.

(G) Installation. Casings shall be installed and centralized within the borehole for even distribution of grout material.

*[(G)](H) Borehole. [Construct the borehole a minimum of ten and five-eighths inches (10 5/8") in diameter to the casing depth. Larger casing may be installed provided the] The borehole [is] must be a minimum of four inches (4") larger in diameter than casing.*

*[(H)](I) Grouting. Grout the annular space of the well full length. It is the responsibility of the well installation contractor to ensure that the annular space is sealed and that the casing does not leak. This responsibility ends three (3) years after the date of approval by the department unless it can be proven that the well seal has been damaged by another person.*

1. Grouting installation methods.

A. Tremie method pursuant to 10 CSR 23-3.030(1)(C)1.B.

B. Tremie pressure method pursuant to 10 CSR 23-3.030(1)(C)1.C.

C. Pressure method pursuant to 10 CSR 23-3.030(1)(C)1.D.

2. Grout materials.

A. Grout types pursuant to 10 CSR 23-3.030(1)(C)2. may be used except powdered or granular non-slurry bentonite.

B. Other grout types may be used upon receiving prior written approval from the department.

*[(I)](J) Wellhead Completion. The wellhead shall be completed pursuant to 10 CSR 23-3.050(6).*

(3) High yield bedrock wells or high yield unconsolidated wells two hundred feet (200') or more in depth.

(B) Joints, Standards, Drive [s]Shoe, Borehole, [Grouting,] and Wellhead Completion shall be followed pursuant to 10 CSR 23-3.030(2)[(D) to 10 CSR 23-3.030(2)(I)].

(C) Grouting.

1. Grout the annular space of the well full-length with neat cement. It is the responsibility of the well installation

contractor to ensure that the annular space is sealed and that the casing does not leak. This responsibility ends three (3) years after the date of approval by the department unless it can be proven that the well seal has been damaged by another person.

2. Grouting installation methods.

A. Tremie method pursuant to 10 CSR 23-3.030(1)(C)1.B.

B. Tremie pressure method pursuant to 10 CSR 23-3.030(1)(C)1.C.

C. Pressure method pursuant to 10 CSR 23-3.030(1)(C)1.D.

(4) High yield unconsolidated wells less than two hundred feet (<200').

(A) *[High yield unconsolidated wells less than two hundred feet (<200') in depth.] Casing.*

1. Install a minimum of twenty feet (20') of casing.

2. Install new steel or plastic casing that meets the minimum standards specified in Table 3.2 or Table 3.4, respectively.

3. Install and centralize casing within the borehole for even distribution of grout material.

*[3.]4. Other design or materials may be used upon receiving prior written approval from the department.*

(B) Borehole. Construct the borehole pursuant to 10 CSR 23-3.030(2)[(G)](H).

(5) Public Water Supply Wells.

(A) Wells that serve a public water system shall not be constructed or altered without authorization pursuant to 10 CSR 60-3.

*[(5)](6) Oil and [g]Gas [z]Zones.*

(A) Report oil or gas encounters and the conversion of water wells to oil or gas wells pursuant to section 256.614, RSMo.

(B) Any water well that encounters oil and/or gas shall have an annular or open hole grout plug from fifty feet (50') below the oil and/or gas bearing zone to fifty feet (50') above the oil and/or gas bearing zone.

(C) The grout plug shall be composed of cement slurry with a two to six percent (2–6%) bentonite additive.

(D) The grout plug shall be placed via one (1) of the tremie methods.

**PROPOSED AMENDMENT**

**10 CSR 23-3.050 Pump Installation and Wellhead Completion.** The department is amending sections (1) and (4).

*PURPOSE: This amendment removes unnecessary language, improves clarity, and inserts inactive well language that is being modified and removed from 10 CSR 23-3.110. The modified inactive well language reduces unnecessary requirements and includes greater flexibility for well caps.*

(1) Pumps and Pumping Equipment.

(A) *[All wells shall have a pump installed that is either]* **Pumps shall be surface mounted or submersible. Water may not be withdrawn from a well by using a bailer or well bucket.**

(B) *[A pump]* **Surface mounted pumps** shall be constructed so that no unprotected openings into the well casing exist. A hand pump, hand pump head, stand or similar device shall have a closed spout directed downward and a pump rod that operates through a stuffing box. A power driven pump shall be attached to the casing or approved suction or discharge line by a watertight connection.

**(C) For inactive wells or new wells waiting on pump installation, the wellhead shall be fitted with a cap that is watertight and sufficiently installed to prohibit vandalism or other contamination from the surface.**

*[(C)](D)* **Backflow Prevention.**

1. A backflow prevention device shall be installed on all wells where agricultural chemical injection or other pressurized contaminant sources are used.

2. A double check-spring loaded backflow prevention device shall be installed between the point of chemical injection and the water well in accordance with the manufacturer's instructions and shall have the following:

A. A valve so that water can be drained from the system to prevent freezing;

B. A vacuum relief valve to prevent back-siphoning of chemicals into the well;

C. An automatic low pressure drain at least three-quarters inch (3/4") in diameter that drains the check valve body of water when operation of the pump is discontinued;

D. A watertight seal around the check valve;

E. An inspection port at least four inches (4") in diameter to allow inspections of the inside of the check valve; and

F. A check valve able to withstand a minimum hydraulic pressure of one hundred fifty (150) pounds per square inch (psi) without leaking and resistant to corrosion.

3. The well pump and the chemical injection pump shall be electrically or mechanically connected so that when the well pump stops, the chemical pump will shut off automatically.

*[(D)](E)* **Electrical.**

1. A permitted pump installation contractor shall perform all electrical wiring that impacts the operation of the pump or pressure system to the point of entry. Any person may perform electrical wiring on high yield wells.

2. The electric wire shall not be installed through the pitless connection and shall be grounded.

*[(E)](F)* **Plumbing.** A permitted pump installation contractor, except as exempted in section 256.607.2, RSMo, shall perform all plumbing *[which]* **that** impacts the distribution of water from its source, through the pressure system to the point of entry. This includes *[,]* but is not limited to *[,]* pressure tanks, water treatment equipment and any other materials needed to complete the *[initial]* installation of the water system, inside and outside of the structure.

(4) Pump Discharge Lines.

(A) A *[buried]* discharge line from the well to the pressure tank shall not be under negative pressure during normal operation.

**10 CSR 23-3.080 Liners.** The department is amending sections (1) and (3).

*PURPOSE: This amendment changes the requirements for depth to top of liner.*

(1) General specifications. All liners shall –

(A) Be new and *[follow]* **meet** minimum specifications in Table 3.8. *[Used pipe is considered new if it is salvaged within ninety (90) days of the installation of a new water well and is decontaminated.]* **Liner shall be new, which includes used liner that is salvaged from a water supply well within ninety (90) days of installation and is decontaminated. Liner must meet one (1) of the following:**

1. **ASTM F480-14 Standard Specifications for Thermoplastic Well Casing Pipe and Coupling Made in Standard Dimension Ratios (SDR), SCH 40 and SCH 80.** This standard is incorporated by reference as published March 1, 2014, by ASTM International, 100 Barr Harbor Drive, PO Box C700, West Conshohocken, PA 19428-2959 and does not incorporate any subsequent amendments or additions;

2. Grade A or B of ASTM A53-A53M-20, *Standard Specifications for Pipe, Steel, Black and Hot-Dipped, Zinc-Coated, Welded, and Seamless*. This standard is incorporated by reference as published July 15, 2020, by ASTM International, 100 Barr Harbor Drive, PO Box C700, West Conshohocken, PA 19428-2959 and does not incorporate any subsequent amendments or additions;

3. Grade A or B of ASTM A500/A500M-21 *Standard Specification for Cold-Formed Welded and Seamless Carbon Steel Structural Tubing in Rounds and Shapes*. This standard is incorporated by reference as published January 21, 2021, by ASTM International, 100 Barr Harbor Drive, PO Box C700, West Conshohocken, PA 19428-2959 and does not incorporate any subsequent amendments or additions;

4. ASTM A589-A589M-06 *Standard Specification for Seamless and Welded Carbon Steel Water-Well Pipe*. This standard is incorporated by reference as published October 2, 2018, by ASTM International, 100 Barr Harbor Drive, PO Box C700, West Conshohocken, PA 19428-2959 and does not incorporate any subsequent amendments or additions.

approval by the department; and

6. Have a minimum thirty-foot (30') annular seal placed above the packers using specifications provided in Table 3.9; and

7. Have the top of the liner extend to within *[ten feet (10')] twenty feet (20')* of the top of casing; and

8. When used to correct inadequate casing seals, place the top packer twenty-five feet (25') below the bottom of the casing. Emplace grout material from above the top packer to a minimum of five feet (5') into the casing for a total of thirty feet (30') of grout.

(C) Be installed so that the top of the liner terminates within *[ten feet (10')] twenty feet (20')* of the top of the casing; and

(3) Liners are used for three (3) general purposes. The following additional requirements apply based on the purpose of the liner:

(B) To prevent rust –

1. The liner shall extend from at least five feet (5') below the bottom of the casing to within *[ten feet (10')] twenty feet (20')* of the top of the casing; and

2. Shall have two (2) packers, with the first packer set within five feet (5') below the bottom of the casing and the second packer set inside the casing near the bottom; and

3. Grout material is optional; and

(C) To seal out undesirable conditions or to correct inadequate casing seals –

1. Have a minimum annular space of one-half inch (½”); and

2. *[Have a minimum of two (2) rubber packers secured below the bottom of the area of concern to be grouted] Have a minimum of two (2) packers installed at a depth that is appropriate for adequate sealing against a smooth section of borehole and is supportive of the grout column above;* and

3. Have packers placed a maximum of ten feet (10') apart; and

4. Use one (1) of the following grout materials:

A. Cement slurry; or

B. Coated bentonite pellets; or

C. Other grout materials upon receiving advanced written approval by the department; and

5. Use one (1) of the following grout methods:

A. Gravity; or

B. Tremie; or

C. Other methods upon receiving advanced written

**PROPOSED AMENDMENT**

**10 CSR 23-3.090 Drilling Areas.** The department is amending the purpose and sections (1)-(13) and removing Tables 3.10, 3.11, 3.12, 3.13, and 3.14.

*PURPOSE: This amendment removes unnecessary language and tables, improves rule clarity, and makes substantive changes to 10 CSR 23-3.090(11)(A) by removing the full-length grout requirement for certain new lower aquifer wells outside of the Impact Areas, modifying the sampling requirements for trichloroethylene and its degradation products for new upper aquifer wells, and modifying casing requirements for wells in Drill Areas 9 and 11.*

*PURPOSE: This rule sets construction standards in addition to 10 CSR 23-3.030 Standards for Construction of Water Wells. These additional standards apply to domestic and multifamily wells and vary by geographic area based on geologic, hydrologic, and/or environmental factors (see Figure 3.1). It is the responsibility of the well installation contractor to determine in which drilling area a proposed well is located and associated construction requirements of that area.*

(1) Area 1. This area encompasses portions of southwestern, central, east-central, and southeastern Missouri (see Figure 3.2).

(A) Bedrock wells.

1. A minimum of eighty feet (80') of casing shall be installed and extend a minimum of thirty feet (30') into solid bedrock. Example: *[If sixty feet (60') of residual material or broken rock is encountered during drilling above solid bedrock, then ninety feet (90') of casing will be installed.]*

2. **Construct [T]the borehole for [a] domestic wells [shall be] a minimum of [eight and five-eighths inches (8 5/8") in diameter to the casing depth] two inches (2") larger than the casing being installed.**

3. Install new casing pursuant to 10 CSR 23-3.030(1)(A).

4. Grouting Requirements.

A. The lowermost thirty feet (30') of casing shall be grouted. *[Table 3.10 lists the minimum amount of grout required by type and size of annulus or open hole.]*

B. Grouting materials and methods shall be followed pursuant to 10 CSR 23-3.030(1)(C).

C. The annular space above the grouted interval shall be filled with clean fill.

(B) Unconsolidated material wells.

1. A minimum of twenty feet (20') of casing shall be installed above the screened or perforated interval.

2. *[The borehole for a domestic well shall be a minimum of ten and five-eighths inches (10 5/8") in diameter to the casing depth.] Construct [T]the borehole for domestic wells [shall be] a minimum of four inches (4") larger in diameter than the casing being installed.*

3. Install new casing pursuant to 10 CSR 23-3.030(1)(A).

4. Grouting Requirements.

A. The upper twenty feet (20') of casing shall be grouted. *[Table 3.11 lists the minimum amount of grout required by type and size of annulus or open hole.]*

B. Grouting methods and materials shall be followed pursuant to 10 CSR 23-3.030(1)(C).

C. A chlorinated gravel pack may be placed into the annular space or native materials may be allowed to collapse

against the well screen or perforated interval.

(2) Area 2. This area encompasses west-central Missouri and is delineated separately because the bedrock has the potential to produce groundwater with high dissolved solids compared to other areas of the state (see Figure 3.3).

(A) Bedrock wells.

1. A minimum of forty feet (40') of casing shall be installed and extend a minimum of fifteen feet (15') into solid bedrock.

2. **Construct [T]the borehole for domestic wells [shall be] a minimum of [eight and five-eighths inches (8 5/8") in diameter to the casing depth] two inches (2") larger than the casing being installed.**

3. Install new casing pursuant to 10 CSR 23-3.030(1)(A).

4. Grouting Requirements.

A. The lowermost thirty feet (30') of casing shall be grouted. *[Table 3.10 lists the minimum amount of grout required by type and size of annulus or open hole.]*

B. Grouting materials and methods shall be followed pursuant to 10 CSR 23-3.030(1)(C).

**C. The annular space above the grouted interval shall be filled with clean fill.**

(B) Unconsolidated material wells.

1. A minimum of twenty feet (20') of casing shall be installed above the screened or perforated interval.

2. *[The borehole shall be a minimum of ten and five-eighths inches (10 5/8") in diameter to the casing depth.] Construct [T]the borehole for domestic wells [shall be] a minimum of four inches (4") larger in diameter than the casing being installed.*

3. Install new casing pursuant to 10 CSR 23-3.030(1)(A).

4. Grouting Requirements.

A. The upper twenty feet (20') of casing shall be grouted. *[Table 3.11 lists the minimum amount of grout required by type and size of annulus or open hole.]*

B. Grouting materials and methods shall be followed pursuant to 10 CSR 23-3.030(1)(C).

C. A chlorinated gravel pack may be placed into the annular space or native materials may be allowed to collapse against the well screen or perforated interval.

(3) Area 3. This area encompasses northwestern and north-central Missouri and is delineated separately because glacial till overlies bedrock that has *[the potential to produce] a higher likelihood of producing* groundwater with high dissolved solids compared to other areas of the state (see Figure 3.4).

(A) Bedrock wells.

1. A minimum of forty feet (40') of casing shall be installed and extend a minimum of fifteen feet (15') into solid bedrock.

2. **Construct the borehole for domestic wells a minimum of [eight and five-eighths inches (8 5/8") in diameter to casing depth] two inches (2") larger than the casing being installed.**

3. Install new casing pursuant to 10 CSR 23-3.030(1)(A).

4. *The casing shall be a minimum of five and one-half inches (5 1/2") in diameter and the borehole shall be a minimum of two inches (2") larger in diameter than the casing being installed.]*

*[5.]4.* Grouting Requirements.

A. The lowermost thirty feet (30') of casing shall be grouted. *[Table 3.12 lists the minimum amount of grout required by type and size of annulus or open hole.]*

B. Grouting materials and methods shall be followed pursuant to 10 CSR 23-3.030(1)(C).

C. The annular space above the grouted interval shall be filled with clean fill.

*[6.]5.* Shallow Bedrock Well - If usable quantities of water

are not expected to be available in deeper bedrock horizons one (1) of the following construction methods may be used.

A. Method 1.

(I) A minimum of forty feet (40') of casing shall be installed pursuant to 10 CSR 23-3.030(1)(A).

(II) A minimum of one foot (1') of casing shall extend into solid bedrock.

(III) **Construct [T]**the borehole for domestic wells *[shall be]* a minimum of *[eight and five eighths (8 5/8") in diameter to the casing depth]* two inches (2") larger than the casing being installed.

*[(IV) The casing shall be a minimum of five and one-half inches (5 1/2") in diameter and the borehole shall be a minimum of two inches (2") larger in diameter than the casing being installed.]*

*[(V)](IV)* The lower thirty feet (30') of casing shall be grouted. *[Table 3.12 lists the minimum amount of grout required by type and size of annulus or open hole.]*

*[(VI)](V)* Grouting materials and methods shall be followed pursuant to 10 CSR 23-3.030(1)(C).

*[(VII)](VI)* The annular space above the grouted interval shall be filled with clean fill.

B. Method 2.

(I) The casing shall be installed full-length pursuant to 10 CSR 23-3.030(1)(A) and perforated below twenty (20') feet across the producing horizon.

(II) **Construct [T]**the borehole for domestic wells *[shall be eight and five-eighths inches (8 5/8") in diameter]* two inches (2") larger than the casing being installed with the upper twenty feet (20') reamed out to *[ten and five-eighths inches (10 5/8") in diameter]* four inches (4") larger than the casing being installed.

*[(III) The casing shall be a minimum of five and one-half inches (5 1/2") in diameter.]*

*[(IV)](III)* The upper twenty feet (20') of annular space shall be grouted and the remainder of the borehole below the grout shall be gravel packed if a packer is not installed. *[Table 3.13 lists the minimum amount of grout required by type and size of annulus or open hole.]*

*[7.6.* All construction requirements pursuant to 10 CSR 23-3.030 shall be met except as stated in 10 CSR 23-3.090(3)(A)*]***6.5.**

(B) Unconsolidated material wells and glacial drift wells.

1. A minimum of twenty feet (20') of casing shall be installed above the screened or perforated interval.

2. *[The borehole for domestic wells shall be a minimum of ten and five-eighths inches (10 5/8") in diameter to casing depth.]* **Construct [T]**the borehole *[shall be]* for domestic wells a minimum of four inches (4") larger in diameter than the casing being installed.

*[3. Well casing shall be a minimum of five and one-half inches (5 1/2") in diameter.]*

*[4.3.* Grouting Requirements.

A. The upper twenty feet (20') of casing shall be grouted. *[Table 3.13 lists the minimum amount of grout required by type and size of annulus or open hole.]*

B. Grouting materials and methods shall be followed pursuant to 10 CSR 23-3.030(1)(C).

C. A chlorinated gravel pack may be placed into the annular space or native materials may be allowed to collapse against the screen or perforated interval.

(4) Area 4. This area encompasses northeastern Missouri and is delineated separately because *[the]* glacial till of **low permeability** overlies bedrock that has *[the potential to produce]* a **higher likelihood of producing** groundwater with high dissolved solids compared to other areas of the state

(see Figure 3.5).

(A) Bedrock wells.

1. A minimum of forty feet (40') of casing shall be installed and extend a minimum of fifteen feet (15') into bedrock.

2. Construct the borehole for domestic wells a minimum of *[eight and five-eighths inches (8 5/8") in diameter to casing depth]* two inches (2") larger than the casing being installed.

3. Install new casing pursuant to 10 CSR 23-3.030(1)(A).

*[4. The casing shall be a minimum of five and one-half inches (5 1/2") in diameter and the borehole shall be a minimum of two inches (2") larger in diameter than the casing being installed.]*

*[5.4.* Grouting Requirements.

A. The lowermost thirty feet (30') of casing shall be grouted.

B. Grouting materials and methods shall be followed pursuant to 10 CSR 23-3.030(1)(C).

C. The annular space above the grouted interval shall be filled with clean fill.

*[6.5.* Shallow bedrock wells - If usable quantities of water are not expected to be available in deeper bedrock horizons the following construction method may be used.

A. Method 1.

(I) A minimum of forty feet (40') of casing shall be installed pursuant to 10 CSR 23-3.030(1)(A).

(II) A minimum of one foot (1') of casing shall extend into solid bedrock.

(III) **Construct [T]**the borehole for domestic wells *[shall be]* a minimum of *[eight and five-eighths inches (8 5/8") in diameter to the casing depth]* two inches (2") larger than the casing being installed.

*[(IV) The casing shall be a minimum of five and a half inches (5 1/2") in diameter and the borehole shall be a minimum of two inches (2") larger in diameter than the casing being installed.]*

*[(V)](IV)* The lower thirty feet (30') of casing shall be grouted. *[Table 3.12 lists the minimum amount of grout required by type and size of annulus or open hole.]*

*[(VI)](V)* Grouting materials and methods shall be followed pursuant to 10 CSR 23-3.030(1)(C).

*[(VII)](VI)* The annular space above the grouted interval shall be filled with clean fill.

*[7.6.* All construction requirements pursuant to 10 CSR 23-3.030 shall be met except as stated in 10 CSR 23-3.090(4)(A)*]***6.5.**

(B) Unconsolidated material wells and glacial drift wells.

1. A minimum of twenty feet (20') of casing shall be installed above the screened or perforated interval.

2. *[The borehole for domestic wells shall be a minimum of ten and five-eighths inches (10 5/8") in diameter to casing depth.]* **Construct [T]**the borehole *[shall be]* for domestic wells a minimum of four inches (4") larger in diameter than the casing being installed.

*[3. Well casing shall be a minimum of five and one-half inches (5 1/2") in diameter.]*

*[4.3.* Grouting Requirements.

A. The upper twenty feet (20') of casing shall be grouted. *[Table 3.13 lists the minimum amount of grout required by type and size of annulus or open hole.]*

B. Grouting materials and methods shall be followed pursuant to 10 CSR 23-3.030(1)(C).

C. A chlorinated gravel pack may be placed into the annular space or native materials may be allowed to collapse against the screen or perforated interval.

(5) Area 5. This area encompasses the Missouri and Mississippi River floodplains and is delineated separately because the

uppermost aquifer consists of unconsolidated alluvium (see Figure 3.6).

(A) Bedrock wells.

1. A minimum of eighty feet (80') of casing shall extend a minimum of thirty feet (30') into bedrock.

2. Construct the borehole **for domestic wells** a minimum of *[eight and five-eighths inches (8 5/8") in diameter to casing depth] two inches (2") larger than the casing being installed.*

3. Install new casing pursuant to 10 CSR 23-3.030(1)(A).

4. The lowermost thirty feet (30') of casing shall be grouted pursuant to 10 CSR 23-3.030(1)(C). *[Table 3.10 lists the minimum amount of grout by type and size of annulus or open hole.]* The annular space above the grouted interval shall be filled with clean fill.

(B) Unconsolidated material wells.

1. A minimum of twenty feet (20') of casing shall be installed above the screened or perforated interval.

2. **Construct [T]the borehole for domestic wells [shall be]** a minimum of four inches (4") larger than the casing diameter installed. Unconsolidated material wells that have a casing diameter less than four inches (<4") in diameter are exempt from these rules.

3. The upper twenty feet (20') of casing shall be grouted pursuant to 10 CSR 23-3.030(1)(C). *[Table 3.14 lists the minimum amount of grout required by type and size of annulus or open hole.]*

4. A chlorinated gravel pack may be placed into the annular space adjacent to the well screen or native materials may be allowed to collapse against the screen or perforated interval.

5. All construction requirements pursuant to 10 CSR 23-3.030 shall be met except as stated in 10 CSR 23-3.090(5)(B)2. and 3.

(6) Area 6. This area encompasses the St. Francois Mountains and is delineated separately because igneous bedrock, which has low permeability, occurs close to the ground surface (Figure 3.7).

(A) Bedrock wells.

1. Bedrock wells where granite is less than one hundred feet (<100') below the surface.

A. A minimum of forty feet (40') of casing shall be installed and extend a minimum of fifteen feet (15') into solid bedrock. Example: If sixty feet (60') of residual material or broken rock is encountered during drilling above solid bedrock, then seventy-five feet (75') of casing shall be installed.

B. Construct the borehole for domestic wells a minimum of *[eight and five-eighths inches (8 5/8") in diameter to casing depth] two inches (2") larger than the casing being installed.*

C. Install new casing pursuant to 10 CSR 23-3.030(1)(A).

D. The lowermost thirty feet (30') of casing shall be grouted. *[Table 3.10 lists the minimum amount of grout required by type and size of annulus or open hole.]* The annular space above the grouted interval shall be filled with clean fill.

E. Grouting materials and methods shall be followed pursuant to 10 CSR 23-3.030(1)(C).

2. Bedrock wells where granite is one hundred feet or more (≥100') below the surface.

A. A minimum of eighty feet (80') of casing shall be installed and shall extend a minimum of thirty feet (30') into solid bedrock.

B. Construct the borehole for domestic wells a minimum of *[eight and five-eighths inches (8 5/8") in diameter to casing depth] two inches (2") larger than the casing being installed.*

C. Install new casing pursuant to 10 CSR 23-3.030(1)(A).

D. The lowermost thirty feet (30') of casing shall be grouted. *[Table 3.10 lists the minimum amount of grout required by type and size of annulus or open hole.]* The annular space above the grouted interval shall be filled with clean fill.

E. Grouting materials and methods shall be followed pursuant to 10 CSR 23-3.030(1)(C).

(B) Unconsolidated material wells.

1. A minimum of twenty feet (20') of casing shall be installed above the screened or perforated interval.

2. *[The borehole for domestic wells shall be a minimum of ten and five-eighths inches (10 5/8") in diameter.] Construct [T]the borehole for domestic wells [shall be]* a minimum of four inches (4") larger in diameter than the casing being installed.

3. Install new casing pursuant to 10 CSR 23-3.030(1)(A).

4. The upper twenty feet (20') of casing shall be grouted. *[Table 3.11 lists the minimum amount of grout required by type and size of annulus or open hole.]*

5. Grouting materials and methods shall be followed pursuant to 10 CSR 23-3.030(1)(C).

6. A chlorinated gravel pack may be placed into the annular space or native materials may be allowed to collapse against the well screen or perforated interval.

(7) Area 7 *[(formerly Sensitive Area A)]*. This area encompasses Osage, Gasconade, Maries, and parts of Phelps, Crawford, and Franklin counties and is delineated separately because it is overlain in part by Pennsylvanian-aged bedrock *[which] that* is capable of producing groundwater with high dissolved solids (see Figure 3.2).

(A) Bedrock Wells.

1. A minimum of eighty feet (80') of casing shall be installed and extend a minimum of thirty feet (30') into solid bedrock. Example: If sixty feet (60') of residual material or broken rock is encountered during drilling above solid bedrock, then ninety feet (90') of casing shall be installed.

2. In areas where Pennsylvanian-age strata (shale, sandstone, and/or clay) are present, a minimum of one hundred fifty feet (150') of casing shall be installed and extend at least thirty feet (30') below the Pennsylvanian age strata (shale, sandstone, and/or clay).

3. **Construct [T]the borehole for domestic wells [shall be]** a minimum of *[eight and five-eighths inches (8 5/8") in diameter to the casing depth] two inches (2") larger than the casing being installed.*

4. Install new casing pursuant to 10 CSR 23-3.030(1)(A).

5. Grouting Requirements.

A. The lowermost thirty feet (30') of casing shall be grouted. *[Table 3.10 lists the minimum amount of grout required by type and size of annulus or open hole.]*

B. Grouting materials and methods shall be followed pursuant to 10 CSR 23-3.030(1)(C).

C. The annular space above the grouted interval shall be filled with clean fill.

(B) Unconsolidated material wells.

1. A minimum of twenty feet (20') of casing shall be installed above the screened or perforated interval.

2. **Construct [T]the borehole for domestic wells [shall be a minimum of ten and five-eighths inches (10 5/8") in diameter and]** a minimum of four inches (4") larger in diameter than the casing being installed.

3. Install new casing pursuant to 10 CSR 23-3.030(1)(A).

4. Grouting Requirements.

A. The upper twenty feet (20') of casing shall be grouted. *[Table 3.11 lists the minimum amount of grout required*



by and size of annulus or open hole.]

B. Grouting materials and methods shall be followed pursuant to 10 CSR 23-3.030(1)(C).

C. A chlorinated gravel pack may be placed into the annular space or native materials may be allowed to collapse against the well screen or perforated interval.

(8) Area 8 [(formerly Sensitive Area B)]. This area encompasses a one-quarter (¼) mile buffer from the twenty foot (20') water depth contour line of major lakes in Missouri (see Figure 3.2).

(A) The major lakes include:]-

1. Truman;
2. Stockton;
3. Table Rock;
4. Bull Shoals;
5. Lake of the Ozarks;
6. Pomme de Terre;
7. [Norfolk] Norfolk; and
8. Clearwater.

(B) Bedrock Wells.

1. Casing shall be installed fifty feet (50') below the deepest point of the lake within one-quarter (¼) mile radius of the well location. Casing shall not be less than the minimum requirements outlined in Drill Area 1 (10 CSR 23-3.090(1)) a minimum of eighty feet (80') and extend thirty feet (30') into bedrock. Formula: well site elevation (feet) - deepest lake elevation within one-quarter (¼) mile (feet) + fifty feet (50') = casing depth. Example: 1000' (well site elevation) - 850' (deepest lake elevation within one-quarter (¼) mile) + 50' = 200' casing depth.

2. A casing point request may be [requested] submitted to the department prior to drilling in Drill Area 8.

3. Construct [T]the borehole for domestic wells [shall be] a minimum of [eight and five-eighths inches (8 ⅝") in diameter to the casing depth] two inches (2") larger than the casing being installed.

4. Install new casing pursuant to 10 CSR 23-3.030(1)(A).

5. When plastic casing is used, liner shall not be used in lieu of casing.

6. When steel casing is used, and the minimum casing depth cannot be achieved due to geologic reasons, casing shall be installed to a minimum of eighty feet (80') extending a minimum of thirty feet (30') into bedrock and a liner used to achieve the remaining casing depth provided the following requirements are met:

A. Have a minimum annular space of one-half inch (½");

B. [Have a minimum of two (2) three- (3-) ribbed rubber packers (K-packers) secured] Secure packers at or below the bottom of the minimum casing depth;

C. Have the top of the liner extend to within [ten feet (10')] twenty feet (20') of the top of casing;

D. Have packers placed a maximum of ten feet (10') apart;

E. Grout pursuant to 10 CSR 23-3.090(8)(B)7. using the gravity or tremie grouting method using cement slurry or coated bentonite pellets; and

F. Liner specifications shall be followed pursuant to 10 CSR 23-3.080(1), (2), (4), and (5).

7. Grouting Requirements.

A. The lowermost thirty feet (30') of casing shall be grouted. [Table 3.10 lists the minimum amount of grout required by type and size of annulus or open hole.]

B. Grouting materials and methods shall be followed pursuant to 10 CSR 23-3.030(1)(C).

C. The annular space above the grouted interval shall

be filled with clean fill.

(9) Area 9 [(formerly Sensitive Area C)]. This area encompasses Greene and parts of Christian [c]County where rapid urbanization is occurring in a sensitive geologic and hydrologic setting. The upper aquifer (Springfield Plateau Aquifer) and lower aquifer (Ozark Aquifer) are **inconstantly** separated by low-permeability bedrock (Ozark Confining Unit). This low-permeability bedrock **generally** limits migration of groundwater and any associated contamination from the upper aquifer to the lower aquifer (see Figure 3.2).

(A) Bedrock Wells.

1. The casing shall be installed a minimum of ten feet (10') below the Ozark Confining Unit. [for as indicated in the digital geospatial dataset "DRILL AREAS" developed by the Missouri Department of Natural Resources, Missouri Geological Survey. Hard copies may be obtained by contacting the Missouri Department of Natural Resources, Missouri Geological Survey, 111 Fairgrounds Road, Rolla, MO 65401.]

2. A casing point request may be submitted to the department prior to drilling in Drill Area 9.

3. Construct [T]the borehole for domestic wells [shall be] a minimum of [eight and five-eighths inches (8 ⅝") in diameter to the casing depth] two inches (2") larger than the casing being installed.

4. Install new casing pursuant to 10 CSR 23-3.030(1)(A).

5. If plastic casing is used, construct the borehole a minimum of four inches (4") larger than the casing being installed. When plastic casing is used, liner shall not be used in lieu of casing.

6. When steel casing is used and the minimum casing depth cannot be achieved due to geologic reasons, casing shall be installed to a minimum of [one hundred feet (100')] eighty feet (80') extending a minimum of thirty feet (30') into bedrock and a liner used to achieve the remaining casing depth provided the following requirements are met:

A. Have a minimum annular space of one-half inch (½");

B. [Have a minimum of two (2) three- (3-) ribbed rubber packers (K-packers) secured] Secure packers at or below the bottom of the Ozark Confining Unit pursuant to 10 CSR 23-3.090(9)(A)1.;

C. Have the top of the liner extend to within [ten feet (10')] twenty feet (20') of the top of casing;

D. Have packers placed a maximum of ten feet (10') apart;

E. Grout pursuant to 10 CSR 23-3.090(9)(A)7. using the gravity or tremie grouting method using cement slurry or coated bentonite pellets; and

F. Liner specifications shall be followed pursuant to 10 CSR 23-3.080(1), (2), (4), and (5).

7. Grouting Requirements.

A. The Ozark Confining Unit shall be grouted from ten feet (10') below the [formation] Ozark Confining Unit to the top of the [shale] Ozark Confining Unit and at a minimum the lowermost thirty feet (30') of casing shall be grouted.

B. When the casing extends more than ten feet (10') below the bottom of the Ozark Confining Unit, more than thirty feet (30') of grout will be required to seal off the Ozark Confining Unit.

C. Grouting materials and methods shall be followed pursuant to 10 CSR 23-3.030(1)(C).

D. The annular space above the grouted interval shall be filled with clean fill.

(10) Area 10 [(formerly Special Area 1)]. This area encompasses

a portion of southeastern Missouri and is composed of deeply weathered and highly fractured bedrock where openings may be filled with mud extending deep into bedrock (see Figure 3.8).

(A) Bedrock Wells.

1. A minimum of eighty feet (80') of casing shall be installed and extend a minimum of fifteen feet (15') into solid bedrock. Example: If *[sixty feet (60')] eighty feet (80')* of residual material or broken rock is encountered during drilling above solid bedrock, then *[seventy-five feet (75')] ninety-five feet (95')* of casing shall be installed. If solid bedrock is not encountered within one hundred and fifty feet (150') the contractor may consult the department for further instructions regarding a variance or install casing into deeper solid bedrock.

2. **Construct** *[T]the borehole for domestic wells [shall be] a minimum of [eight and five-eighths inches (8 5/8") in diameter to the casing depth] two inches (2") larger than the casing being installed.*

*[3. In areas where poor drilling conditions exist and it is necessary to drive multiple strings of smaller diameter casing through the surface casing, each succeeding smaller diameter casing shall extend into the preceding casing at least twenty feet (20').]*

*[4.]3. Install new [steel] casing pursuant to 10 CSR 23-3.030(1)(A).*

*[5.]4. Grouting Requirements.*

A. If casing is driven, see 10 CSR 23-3.030(1)(D) for liner and grouting requirements.

B. If casing is not driven, the lowermost thirty feet (30') of casing shall be grouted. *[Table 3.10 lists the minimum amount of grout required by type and size of annulus or open hole.]*

(I) Grouting materials and methods shall be followed pursuant to 10 CSR 23-3.030(1)(C).

(II) The annular space above the grouted interval shall be filled with clean fill.

(11) Area 11 *[(formerly Special Area 2)]*. This area encompasses Newton and Jasper County and is delineated separately due to the contamination of portions of the upper aquifer by one (1) or more of the following: lead, cadmium, chlorinated **volatile organic compounds** (VOCs) including **trichloroethylene** (TCE), TCE degradation products, or other contaminants pursuant to 10 CSR 60-4. The upper aquifer (Springfield Plateau Aquifer) and lower aquifer (Ozark Aquifer) are **inconstantly** separated by low-permeability bedrock (Ozark Confining Unit). This low-permeability bedrock **generally** limits migration of groundwater and any associated contamination from the upper aquifer to the lower aquifer (see Figure 3.2).

(A) Bedrock Wells.

*[1. Consult the digital geospatial dataset "DRILL AREAS" developed by the Missouri Department of Natural Resources, Missouri Geological Survey. Hard copies may be obtained by contacting the Missouri Department of Natural Resources, Missouri Geological Survey, 111 Fairgrounds Road, Rolla, MO 65401. This dataset identifies the maximum well depth for wells completed in the upper aquifer; the required casing depth for a lower aquifer well; and Impact Areas.]*

*[2.]1. Wells outside of Impact Areas may be installed in the upper aquifer provided they do not penetrate the Ozark Confining Unit; or wells may be installed and cased/sealed through the Ozark Confining Unit and open to only the lower aquifer.*

*[3.]2. New upper aquifer wells outside of Impact Areas.*

A. Total depth of the well shall not penetrate the Ozark

Confining Unit *[and not exceed the upper depth indicated digital geospatial dataset "DRILL AREAS"]*.

B. A minimum of eighty feet (80') of casing shall be installed and extend a minimum of thirty feet (30') into solid bedrock. Example: If sixty feet (60') of residual material or broken rock is encountered during drilling above solid bedrock, then ninety feet (90') of casing will be installed.

C. **Construct** *[T]the borehole for domestic wells [shall be] a minimum of [eight and five-eighths inches (8 5/8") in diameter to the casing depth] two inches (2") larger than the casing being installed.*

D. Install new casing pursuant to 10 CSR 23-3.030(1)(A).

E. Grouting Requirements.

(I) The lowermost thirty feet (30') of casing shall be grouted. *[Table 3.10 lists the minimum amount of grout required by type and size of annulus or open hole.]*

(II) Grouting materials and methods shall be followed pursuant to 10 CSR 23-3.030(1)(C).

(III) The annular space above the grouted interval shall be filled with clean fill.

F. New upper aquifer wells shall follow sampling requirements pursuant to 10 CSR 23-3.090(11)(A)6.

*[4.]3. New lower aquifer wells outside of the Impact Areas.*

A. The casing shall be installed a minimum of ten feet (10') below the Ozark Confining Unit *[or to the lower depth indicated on the digital geospatial dataset "DRILL AREAS"]*.

B. A casing point request may be submitted to the department **prior to drilling in Drill Area 11**.

C. Install new casing pursuant to 10 CSR 23-3.030(1)(A).

D. If steel casing is used, **construct** the borehole *[shall be] a minimum of [eight and five-eighths inches (8 5/8") in diameter to the casing depth] two inches (2") larger than the casing being installed.*

E. When steel casing is used and the minimum casing depth cannot be achieved due to geologic reasons, casing shall be installed to a minimum of eighty feet (80') extending thirty feet (30') into bedrock **with the lowermost thirty feet (30') of casing grouted pursuant to 10 CSR 23-3.090(11)(A)3.E.** and a liner used to achieve the remaining casing depth provided the following requirements are met:

(I) Have a minimum annular space of one-half inch (1/2");

(II) *[Have a minimum of two (2) three- (3-) ribbed rubber packers (K-packers) secured] Secure packers* at or below the bottom of the Ozark Confining Unit pursuant to 10 CSR 23-3.090(11)(A)4.A.;

(III) Have the top of the liner extend to within *[ten feet (10')] twenty feet (20')* of the top of casing;

(IV) Have packers placed a maximum of ten feet (10') apart;

(V) Grout **using methods and materials** pursuant to 10 CSR 23-3.090(11)(A)4.G.(II) and (III) from the top packer to extend ten feet (10') inside the casing using the gravity or tremie grouting method using cement slurry or coated bentonite pellets; and

(VI) Liner specifications shall be followed pursuant to 10 CSR 23-3.080(1), (2), (4), and (5).

F. If plastic casing is used, **construct** the borehole *[shall be] a minimum of [ten inches (10") in diameter to casing depth] four inches (4") larger than the casing being installed.* When plastic casing is used, liner shall not be used in lieu of casing.

G. Grouting Requirements.

(I) Full-length grout is required.

(II) Grouting methods shall be Tremie Pressure, Pressure, or Positive Displacement pursuant to 10 CSR 23-



3.030(1)(C)1.C., 10 CSR 23-3.030(1)(C)1.D., and 10 CSR 23-3.030(1)(C)1.F.

(III) Grouting materials shall be cement slurry or high-solids bentonite slurry.

(IV) Wells with eighty feet (80') of casing may use grouting materials and methods pursuant to 10 CSR 23-3.030(1)(C).

H. All construction requirements pursuant to 10 CSR 23-3.030 shall be met except as provided in 10 CSR 23-3.090(11)(A)4.G.

**[5.]4.** Major reconstruction of wells in Area 11 that involve *[exceeding the upper depth indicated in the digital geospatial dataset "DRILL AREAS" or]* penetrating the Ozark Confining Unit require[s] advanced written approval from the department.

**[6.]5.** Sampling *[R]*requirements for new upper aquifer wells.

A. Water sampling and analysis shall be performed for lead[,] and cadmium[.]. **Additionally, for new wells constructed in adjoining quarter-sections, including corner points, of TCE impact areas, water sampling and analysis shall also be performed for TCE and its degradation products [for new wells]. Wells will not be certified until all sampling has been completed and results received by the department.**

B. Permitted pump installers and owners who self-install pumps are responsible for ensuring sampling is completed according to laboratory sampling protocol and submitting sample results within sixty (60) days of pump installation.

C. The laboratory that analyzes the sample shall be certified by the EPA or the department for such analyses.

D. Prior to sampling, *[the well shall be purged continuously for a minimum of two (2) hours and water samples collected from] run water from* the tap closest to the well **at full capacity for ten (10) minutes then reduce flow for sample collection.**

E. All new upper aquifer wells shall be constructed with a sampling port or tap within twenty feet (20') of the wellhead.

F. If an upper aquifer well contains levels of lead, cadmium, TCE or its degradation products that are above the **respective Maximum Contaminant Level (MCL) or Action Level (AL)**, the well *[shall] may* –

(I) Be plugged full-length with approved grout material; or

(II) Be reconstructed and sealed through the Ozark Confining Unit pursuant to 10 CSR 23-3.090(11)(A)5.

**[7.]6.** Well installation in Impact Areas.

A. The casing shall be installed a minimum of ten feet (10') below the Ozark Confining Unit *[or to the lower depth indicated in the digital geospatial dataset "DRILL AREAS"]*.

B. A casing point request may be submitted to the department **prior to drilling in Drill Area 11.**

C. Install new casing pursuant to 10 CSR 23-3.030(1)(A). **A liner shall not be used in lieu of casing.**

D. **Construct [T]the borehole [shall] to be a minimum of [ten inches (10") in diameter to casing depth] four inches (4") larger than the casing being installed.**

E. Grouting Requirements.

(I) Full-length grout is required.

(II) Grouting methods shall be Tremie Pressure, Pressure, or Positive Displacement pursuant to 10 CSR 23-3.030(1)(C)1.C., 10 CSR 23-3.030(1)(C)1.D., and 10 CSR 23-3.030(1)(C)1.F.

(III) Grouting materials shall be cement slurry or high-solids bentonite slurry.

(12) Area 12 *[(formerly Special Area 3)]*. This area encompasses portions of Franklin County within and south of the city of New Haven and is delineated separately due to the contamination of portions of the aquifer by one (1) or more of the following known contaminants: tetrachloroethylene or perchloroethylene (PCE), trichloroethylene (TCE), TCE degradation products, and may include other contaminants pursuant to 10 CSR 60-4. It is necessary to implement more stringent well construction standards for new wells that are drilled into the aquifer and to limit the deepening of existing upper aquifer wells (see Figure 3.9).

(13) Area 13 *[(formerly Special Area 4)]*. This area encompasses portions of St. Charles County west of the city of Weldon Spring and is delineated separately due to contamination of portions of the aquifer by one (1) or more of the following known contaminants listed by source in Table 3.1[5]0. In this area it is necessary to implement more stringent well construction standards for new wells that are drilled into the aquifer and to limit the deepening of existing upper aquifer wells (see Figure 3.10).

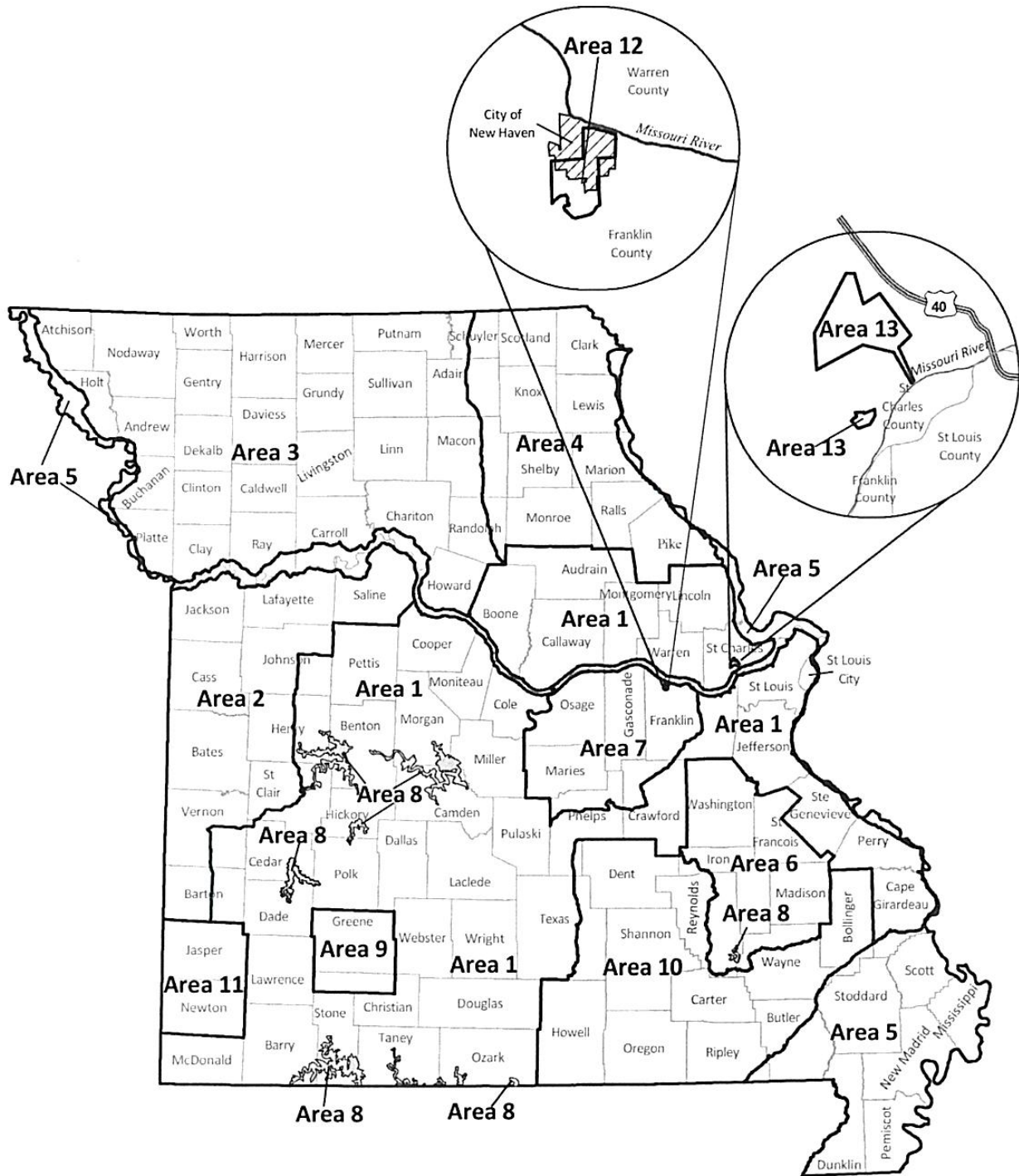


Figure 3.2 Drilling Areas 1, 7, 8, 9, and 11.

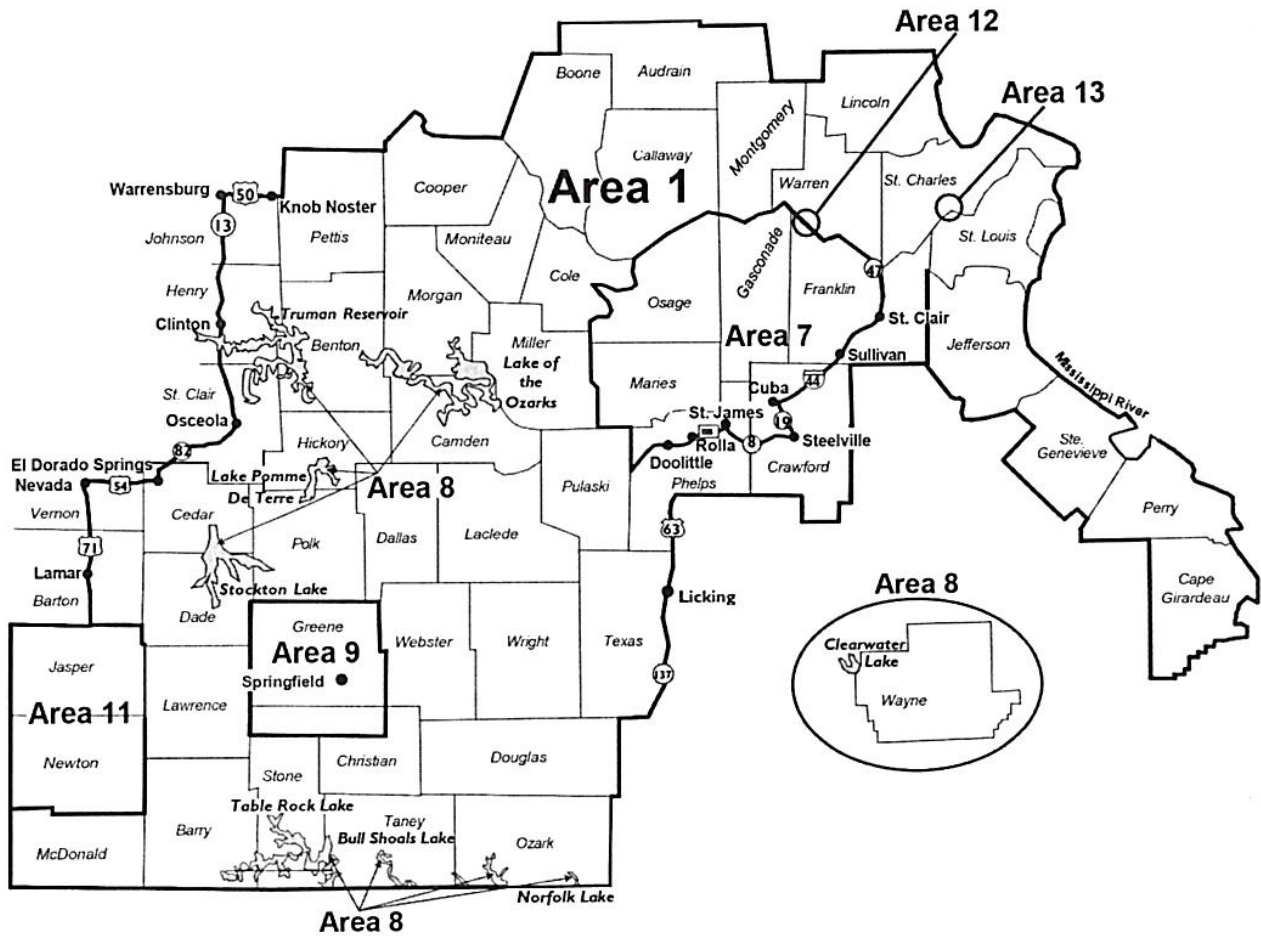


Figure 3.3 Drilling Area 2.

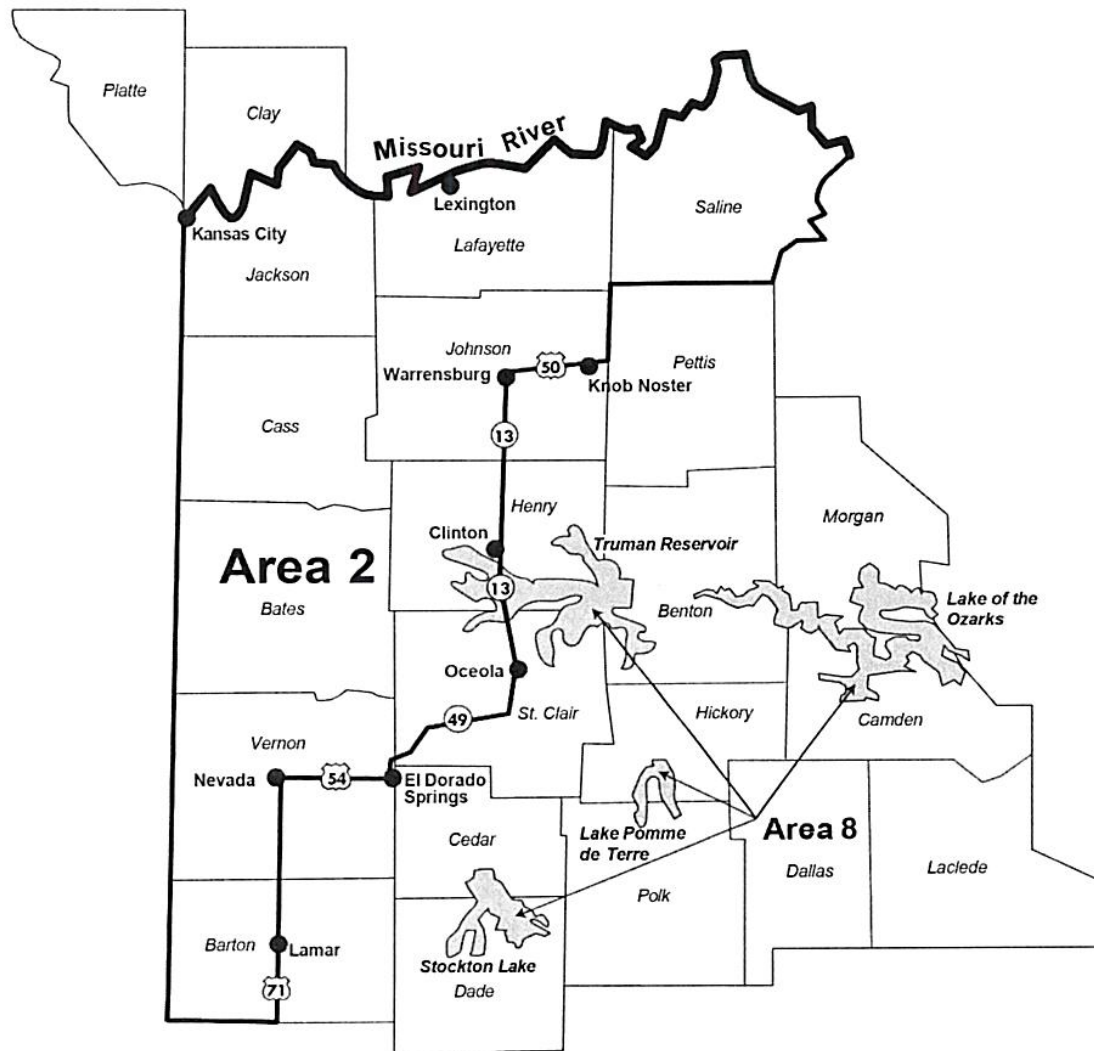




Figure 3.4 Drilling Area 3.

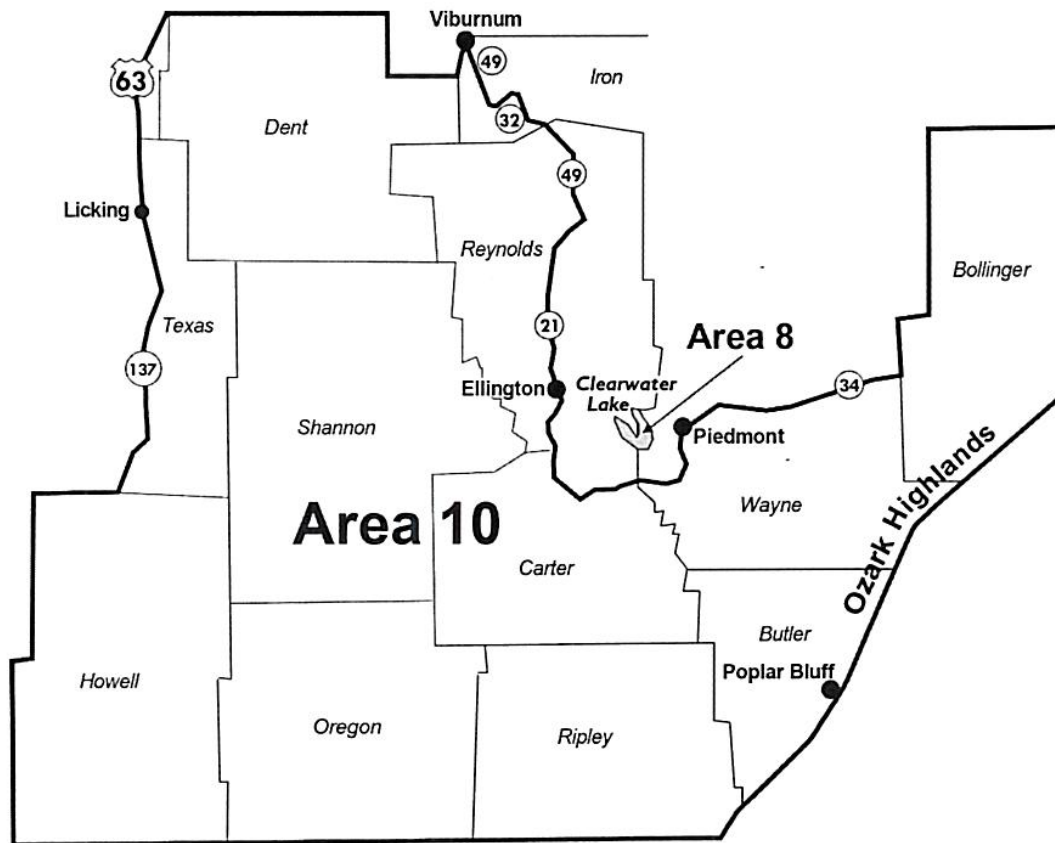


Figure 3.9 Drilling Area 12.

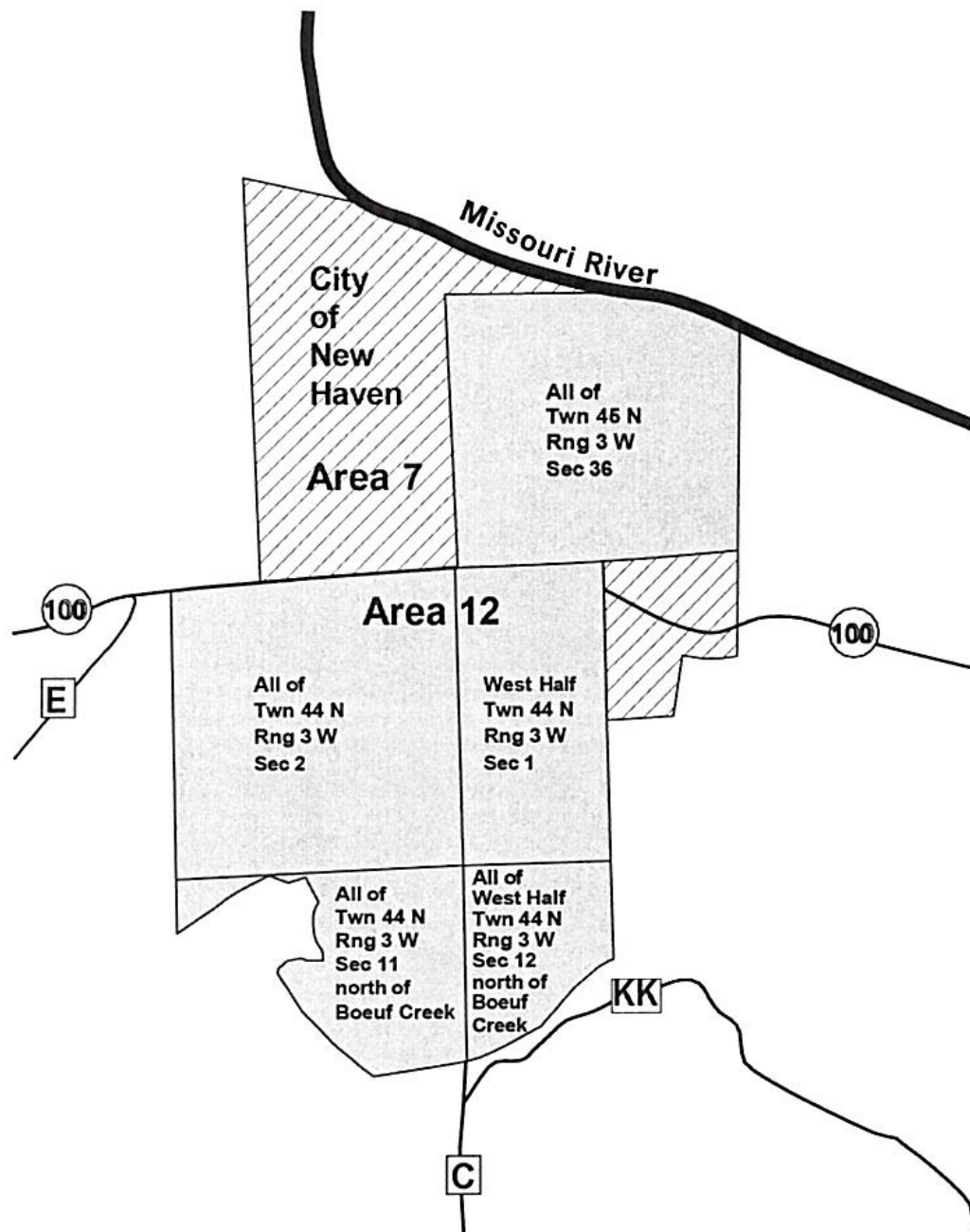
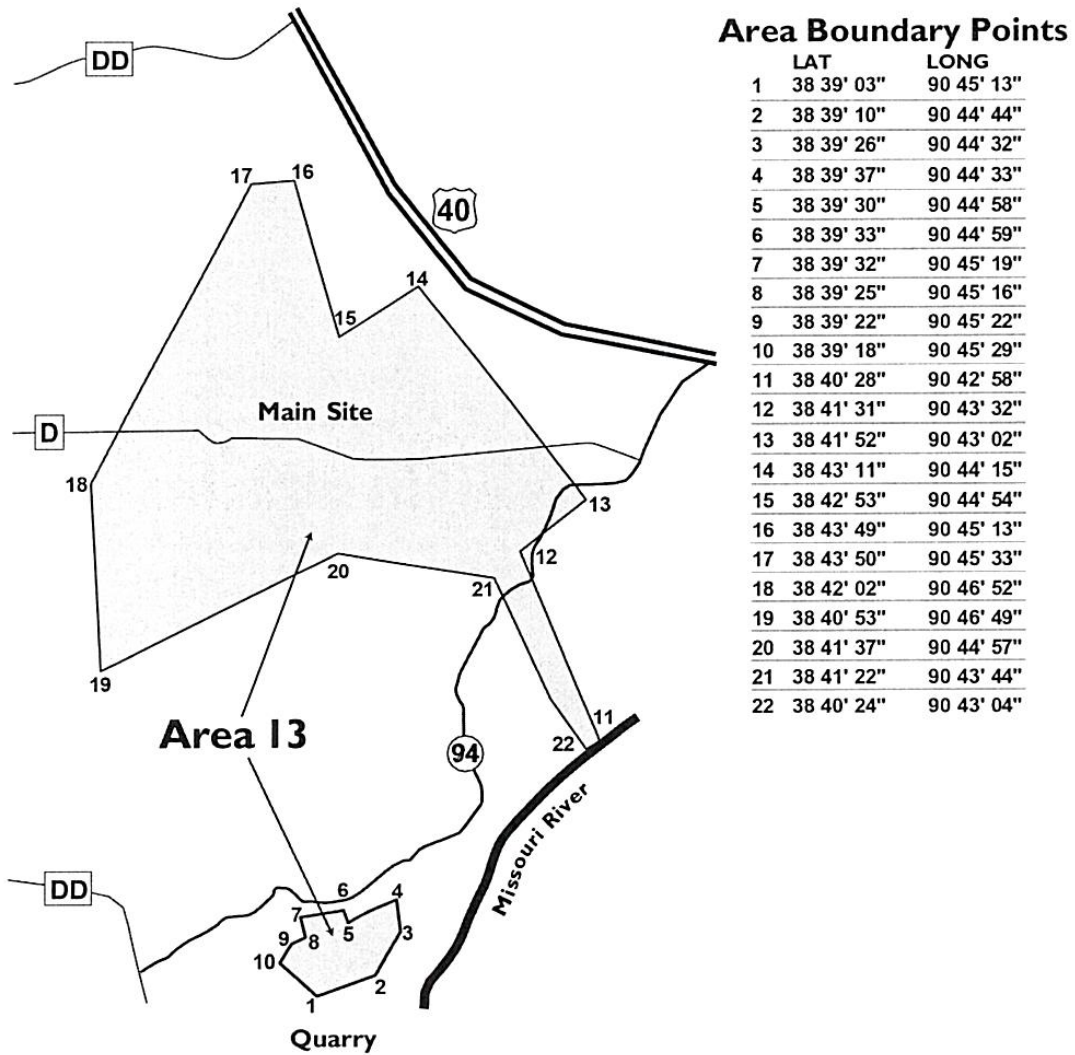


Figure 3.10 Drilling Area 13.

**PROPOSED AMENDMENT**

**10 CSR 23-3.110 Plugging of Water Wells.** The department is amending sections (2), (4), and (5), and removing figures 1-8 from the rule.

*PURPOSE: This amendment removes unnecessary language and figures, improves clarity, adds the option and instructions for well or pump installation contractors to plug public water supply wells without having to contact the department for case-by-case plugging specifications, and moves relevant inactive well language to 10 CSR 23-3.050.*

(2) General Plugging Methods.

(H) New or existing wells that have unusual conditions, **which** include[s] but **are** not limited to[, ] contamination, a liner, a foreign object, or a pump stuck in the borehole, shall be plugged full-length by a permitted contractor using cement, emplacing the cement grout by one (1) of the following methods: tremie, tremie pressure, or reverse tremie. Alternate plugging methods may be used upon advanced written approval by the department.

(4) High Yield Well Plugging Requirements.

**(A) High yield wells must receive prior approval from the department, unless they are plugged in accordance with subsection (B) or (C) of this section.**

**[A](B) Bedrock Wells.**

*[1. All high yield wells may be plugged using the following method without prior approval from the department.]*

*[A.]1. Remove all materials from the well prior to plugging.*

*[B.]2. Cut the casing two feet (2') below ground surface or flush with bedrock if encountered. If the well is located in an agricultural setting, remove the top three feet (3') of casing below ground surface.*

*[C.]3. Disinfect the well. If water is in the well, add chlorine to the water pursuant to 10 CSR 23-3.050(7).*

*[D.]4. Fill the well full-length from total depth to the top of casing with cement slurry using one (1) of the tremie or reverse tremie methods.*

*[E.]5. Fill the remaining hole above the cut off casing with soil or fill material.*

*[2. Other methods including the use of fill material may be used upon receiving advanced written approval by the department.]*

**[(B)](C) Unconsolidated wells.**

1. Wells two hundred feet or less ( $\leq 200'$ ) in total depth may be plugged as follows:

A. Remove all materials prior to plugging;

B. Cut the casing two feet (2') below ground surface. If well is located in an agricultural setting, remove the top three feet (3') of casing below ground surface;

C. Fill the well from total depth to twenty feet (20') from surface with disinfected clean fill;

D. Plug the upper twenty feet (20') with bentonite or cement grout; and

E. Fill the remaining hole above the cut off casing with soil or fill material.

2. Wells greater than two hundred feet ( $>200'$ ) total depth may be plugged pursuant to 10 CSR 23-3.110(3)(B).

*[3. Other plugging materials and methods may be used upon receiving advanced written approval by the department.]*

*[(5) Inactive Water Wells may remain unplugged for a period no longer than five (5) years from the date the well became inactive provided the well owner obtains written approval from the department.*

*(A) Certified wells. Upon approval of inactive water well status, the pump must be removed and the wellhead provided with a permanent steel plate welded or a PVC cap glued. At the end of the five (5) year period, the well is considered abandoned and shall be plugged if not in service pursuant to 10 CSR 23-3.110.*

*(B) Noncertified wells. Prior to approval of inactive water well status, the following shall be completed:*

1. The well owner or permitted pump installation contractor shall remove the pump;

2. Allow the department to inspect the well by use of a downhole camera;

3. Protect the wellhead by a permanent steel plate welded or a PVC cap glued; and

4. The well casing length shall meet the construction requirement for the drill area the well is located in.

*(C) The department will deny the request for inactive status if any of the requirements listed under 10 CSR 23-3.110(4)(B) are not met, the well does not meet minimum construction standards, or the well is found to be in a state of disrepair.*

1. The well owner may reconstruct the well to meet minimum construction standards. Once the reconstruction report is approved, the well owner may reapply for inactive well status.

2. If the well is not operational at the end of the five (5) year period, the well is considered abandoned and shall be plugged if not in service pursuant to 10 CSR 23-3.110.]

**(5) Public Water Supply Well Plugging Requirements.**

**(A) Public water supply wells must receive prior approval from the department, unless plugged in accordance with subsection (4)(B) of this rule.**

**PROPOSED AMENDMENT**

**10 CSR 23-4.060 Construction Standards for Monitoring Wells.** The department is amending sections (1), (3), (4), (8), (9), (11), and (13).

**PURPOSE:** This amendment improves rule clarity by removing unnecessary language, properly incorporating references, correcting an erroneous citation, and allowing use of multi-depth groundwater monitoring systems.

(1) Riser Pipe and Screen Material.

(C) Thermoplastic and fluoropolymer riser pipe shall –

1. Be new and meet *[ASTM standards]* **the requirements of 10 CSR 23-3.030(1)(A);**

2. Be a minimum diameter of two inches (2") except that direct-push wells may have riser pipe with a minimum nominal diameter of three-quarters of an inch (3/4");

3. Be a minimum of Schedule 40 for wells one hundred feet or less ( $\leq 100'$ ) and a minimum of Schedule 80 for wells greater than one hundred feet ( $>100'$ ). Gas-migration wells using a soil gas implant and tubing are exempt from this requirement; and

4. Be joined to screen by a watertight mechanical type joint.

(D) Metallic riser pipe shall –

1. **Be new and meet the requirements of 10 CSR 23-3.030(1)(A);**

*[1.2.]* Be a minimum diameter of two inches (2") except that direct-push wells may have riser pipe and screen with a minimum diameter of three-quarters of an inch (3/4").

*[2.3.]* Have an equivalent wall thickness –

A. For carbon, low-carbon, and galvanized steel not less than Schedule 40;

B. For stainless steel not less than Schedule 5; and

C. For joint wall thickness shall **be** not less than Schedule 40; and

*[3.4.]* Be joined by a watertight mechanical joint or welded.

(3) Monitoring well boreholes shall –

(C) For gas-migration type wells using soil vapor implants, be a minimum of one inch (1") in diameter *[and be exempt from these borehole standards if properly plugged within thirty (30) days of completion];* and

(D) For direct-push wells, be a minimum of three and one-quarter inches (3.25") in diameter *[and be exempt from these borehole standards if properly plugged within thirty (30) days of completion].*

(4) *[Open-hole completions may be allowed upon advanced written approval by the department. If approved.]* **For open-hole completions,** the open-hole portion shall be in competent, consolidated bedrock, with the casing extending from the surface to the minimum total depth and minimum depth into bedrock pursuant to 10 CSR 23-3.090 for a domestic well at that location. The casing shall be grouted full-length using methods and materials pursuant to 10 CSR 23-4.060(2)*[(E)](D)*.

(8) Bentonite Seal. A **non-slurry** bentonite seal of two feet (2') or greater is required if the annular seal is composed of slurry grout material and a secondary filter pack is not used.

(9) Installation of the Annular Seal. The annular seal must extend from the secondary filter pack or bentonite seal to the base of the surface completion. The combined annular seal and bentonite seal (if a bentonite seal is utilized) must be at least two feet (2') thick unless monitoring for shallow contaminants. Monitoring wells constructed for shallow monitoring must have a minimum combined annular seal and bentonite seal (if a bentonite seal is used) of at least one foot (1'). The following grout types are permitted in monitoring wells:

(B) Non-slurry *[B]*bentonite. Chipped or pelletized varieties that are designed to fall through standing water may be used when sealing the annulus of a well that is below the saturated zone. Granulated and powdered bentonite must never be poured through standing water because they will flash swell and bridge off before getting to the bottom of the annular space. Bentonite chips or pellets may be used to seal portions of the annular space that are in the unsaturated zone. Granulated and powdered varieties are not permitted to be used in the unsaturated zone unless they are used to create a slurry, due to their flash swelling properties which would prevent hydration of the complete column of bentonite. When using bentonite chips or pellets in the unsaturated zone, it must be hydrated after each *[three feet]* **three-foot** (3') interval has been emplaced. To properly hydrate the bentonite, a minimum of three (3) times as much water as bentonite must be used. Water used must be of potable quality;

(11) Alternate monitoring well construction procedures, methods, or technologies **such as nested well construction or multi-depth groundwater monitoring systems** may be used provided advanced written approval is obtained from the department.

(13) *[Nested well construction may be allowed upon advanced written approval by the department.]* Gas-migration wells constructed using soil vapor implants shall meet minimum primary filter pack requirements pursuant to 10 CSR 23-4.060(6), have a minimum bentonite seal of one foot (1') placed between each primary filter pack, and have a minimum of

one and one-half feet (1.5') of bentonite seal placed between the uppermost primary filter pack and the base of the surface completion.

Chapter 5 – Heat Pump Construction Code**

**PROPOSED AMENDMENT**

**10 CSR 23-5.050 Construction Standards for Closed-Loop Heat Pump Wells.** The department is amending sections (2), (6)-(9), (11), (12), and adding a new section (13).

*PURPOSE:* The purpose of the amendment is to remove unnecessary language, improve clarity, remove pre-notification requirements, properly incorporate references, and add tracer wire requirements.

*PUBLISHER'S NOTE:* The secretary of state has determined that the publication of the entire text of the material which is incorporated by reference as a portion of this rule would be unduly cumbersome or expensive. This material as incorporated by reference in this rule shall be maintained by the agency at its headquarters and shall be made available to the public for inspection and copying at no more than the actual cost of reproduction. This note applies only to the reference material. The entire text of the rule is printed here.

(2) Heat Pump Loop Material. In a closed-loop heat pump well, the material used to make up the heat-exchange loop that is placed in the borehole or trench must be composed of high density polyethylene or polybutylene pipe and [must be] installed and grouted without delay upon completion of drilling each well.

(A) High Density Polyethylene Pipe. This pipe must be manufactured in accordance with dimensional specifications of [ASTM D-2513 or ASTM F-714 and must have a minimum cell classification of PE345434C or PE355434C when tested under ASTM D-3350 to be acceptable for use in closed-loop

heat pump systems.]—

1. ASTM D-2513, *Standard Specification for Polyethylene (PE) Gas Pressure Pipe, Tubing, and Fittings*. This standard is incorporated by reference as published December 15, 2020, by ASTM International, 100 Barr Harbor Drive, PO Box C700, West Conshohocken, PA 19428-2959 and does not incorporate any subsequent amendments or additions; or

2. A minimum cell classification of PE345434C or PE355434C when tested pursuant to ASTM D-3350 *Standard Specification for Polyethylene Plastics Pipe and Fittings Materials*. This standard is incorporated by reference as published July 21, 2021, by ASTM International, 100 Barr Harbor Drive, PO Box C700, West Conshohocken, PA 19428-2959 and does not incorporate any subsequent amendments or additions.

(B) Polybutylene Pipe. This pipe must be manufactured in accordance with ASTM D-2581 *Standard Specification for Polybutylene (PB) Plastics Molding and Extrusion Materials*. This standard is incorporated by reference as published August 16, 2017, by ASTM International, 100 Barr Harbor Drive, PO Box C700, West Conshohocken, PA 19428-2959 and does not incorporate any subsequent amendments or additions. The pipe material must be —

1. Either Class B (general purpose and dielectric, in colors) or Class C (weather resistant, black in color containing not less than two percent (2%) carbon black);

2. Type II (density, ninety-one thousandths to ninety-two thousandths (0.091–0.092) grams per centimeter (g/cm)); and

3. Grade 1 (flow rate twenty-five thousandths to seventy-five thousandths (0.025–0.075) gallons per ten (10) minutes (g/10 min)).

(6) Borehole Depth. Closed-loop heat pump wells must not be deeper than five hundred feet (500'). [Total depth of a new heat pump well in Drilling Area 12 (formerly Special Area 3) and Drilling Area 13 (formerly Special Area 4) shall be determined in advance of drilling by the department.]

(7) Grouting Depth of Vertical Heat Pump Wells. Grouting the annulus of a heat pump well must be completed immediately after the well is drilled due to cave-in potential in the uncased hole.

(A) Vertical heat pump wells require the annular space between the loop material[,] and the borehole[, and/] or casing to be grouted full-length using materials [in] pursuant to 10 CSR 23-5.050(8), except as allowed in subsection (7)(B) of this rule.

[(B) Vertical heat pump wells drilled two hundred feet (200') or less that are not grouted full-length must follow the hole size requirements stated in section (5) and nonslurry bentonite plugs must be placed in the borehole. A plug (first plug) must be placed forty feet (40') above the total depth of the borehole. This plug must be composed of bentonite chips or pellets utilizing at least one (1) bag of bentonite resulting in at least a five foot (5') plug. Every forty feet (40') of borehole that exists above the first plug must have a plug set as described in this section. A near surface plug, consisting of bentonite granules or powder, must be set from a point ten feet (10') below the bottom of the trench that connects the closed-loop to the heat pump machine to the base of the trench. All bentonite plugs must be hydrated immediately with six to eight (6–8) gallons of potable water for each bag of bentonite after emplacement if they are in the unsaturated zone. All clean fill material placed between the bentonite plugs must be chlorinated. Clean fill is defined as sand, local drill cuttings, pea gravel, varied sized agricultural lime, or clean aggregate free from contamination.]

Contractors utilizing this type of grouting method must notify the department at least forty-eight (48) hours prior to beginning any construction on the system. The department will maintain a list of current notification methods (includes, but is not limited to, telephone, fax, email, voice mail, and the department's online notification system) and contact information available online or upon request. Notification information must include: owner name, owner address, GPS location, date work is to begin, primary contractor name, primary contractor permit number, drilling contractor name, and drilling contractor permit number.]

(B) Vertical heat pump wells drilled two hundred feet (200') or less may not be grouted full-length only if they –

1. Follow borehole size requirements of 10 CSR 23-5.030(5);
2. Use grout plugs consisting of bentonite chips or pellets;
3. Place a five-foot (5') grout plug every forty feet (40'), beginning forty feet (40') above the bottom of the borehole;
4. Place the uppermost grout plug within ten feet (10') of the surface;
5. Hydrate all bentonite plugs immediately after emplacement, if they are in the unsaturated zone; and
6. Use clean fill for any material placed between the bentonite plugs.

(8) Approved Grout Materials. The following [four (4)] grout types are permitted for use in heat pump wells:

(B) [Nonslurry]Bentonite [Only chipped or pelletized bentonite may be used when sealing the annulus of a well that is below the water level in the saturated zone. All nonslurry sodium bentonite varieties may be used in the unsaturated zone if the hole is dry and no bridging occurs. The dry bentonite must be hydrated after emplacement;] chips or pellets;

(9) Wells that Encounter Karst Conditions. When a borehole encounters caves or larger fractures, chlorinated clean fill[, such as gravel or sand,] may be used to fill these intervals. Small fractures are effectively sealed by using chipped, hydrated bentonite. If the borehole cannot be grouted as specified, it must be plugged.

[(11) Heat Pump Wells in Drilling Areas (12) (formerly Special Area 3) may be constructed provided advanced written approval is obtained from the department pursuant to 10 CSR 23-3.090(12).]

(11) Heat Pump Wells in Drilling Areas pursuant to 10 CSR 23-3.090(9) and Drilling Area 11 pursuant to 10 CSR 23-3.090(11) that penetrate the Ozark Confining Unit shall –

- (A) Be grouted from ten feet (10') below the Ozark Confining Unit through the top of the Ozark Confining Unit; or
- (B) If the Ozark Confining Unit is not fully penetrated, be grouted from the bottom of the borehole through the top of the Ozark Confining Unit.

(12) Heat Pump Wells in Drilling Area [13 (formerly Special Area 4)] 12 pursuant to 10 CSR 23-3.090(12) and Drilling Area 13 pursuant to 10 CSR 23-3.090(13) may be constructed provided advanced written approval is obtained from the department [pursuant to 10 CSR 23-3.090(13)].

(13) Conductive tracer wire that responds to aboveground electromagnetic locating equipment shall be laid in all horizontal trenches containing supply and return lines.

Tracer wire shall –

- (A) Be laid in a continuous loop;
- (B) Be buried a minimum of twenty-four (24) inches deep; and
- (C) Have the ends of the wire accessible at the surface in a test port or terminated above final grade at the building foundation with a permanent sign indicating the nature of the wires.

**III. WORKSHEET**

10 CSR 23-5.050

This proposed rule requires all newly constructed closed loop heat pump system installations to have conductive tracer wire placed in all horizontal trenches containing supply and return lines.

Currently, there is no requirement for conductive tracer wire placement in all horizontal trenches containing supply and return lines.



For the effective protection of groundwater, the proposed rule would require the addition of conductive tracer wire in all horizontal trenches containing supply and return lines. The following calculation shows the proposed materials cost charged to the system owner.

$$(125 \text{ feet}^{(1)} \text{ of tracer wire}) * (\$0.17/\text{ft}^{(2)}) = \$ 21.25$$

Total material cost = \$21.25

This results in an average of \$21.25 per closed loop heat pump system.

The average cost increase per system multiplied by the average number of systems installed per year with conductive tracer wire equals the total annual cost increase.

$$(\$21.25) * (160 \text{ wells}^{(3)}) = \$3,400.00$$

Based on the annual cost of construction over a 5 year aggregate period is \$17,000.00

**PROPOSED AMENDMENT**

**12 CSR 10-24.200 Driver License Classes.** The director is amending sections (2) and (15) and adding a new section (18).

*PURPOSE: This amendment updates language to match recent changes to the Missouri statute definition of the school bus in 302.010, RSMo, as well as adding additional language clarifying actions required under the Driver License Compact in 302.600, RSMo.*

(2) Class A – The holder of a Class A license may drive any combination of vehicles with a Gross Combination Weight Rating (GCWR) of twenty-six thousand one pounds (26,001 lbs.) or more, provided the Gross Vehicle Weight Rating (GVWR) of the vehicle(s) being towed is ten thousand one pounds (10,001 lbs.) or more[;], provided[,] the license bears the proper endorsement(s), if any, required for the type of vehicle being driven. A holder of a Class A license may drive all vehicles [which] that may be driven by a holder of a Class B, Class C, Class E, or Class F license, but not motorcycles or vehicles [which] that require an endorsement(s) unless the proper endorsement(s) appears on the license.

(15) In addition to holding the appropriate class of license as prescribed, the driver of a school bus owned by or under contract with a public school or the State Board of Education[,] must have qualified for and obtained an S endorsement in accordance with the requirement of section 302.272, RSMo. In addition, the holder of an S endorsement may be issued a restriction limiting the classification of a school bus in which the driver may operate. The restriction is determined by the school bus in which the driving skills examination was completed. **The driver of a school bus, as defined in section 301.010, RSMo, that is less than or equal to twelve thousand pounds (12,000 lbs) and designed to transport ten (10) or fewer passengers is not required to obtain other than a Class F operator license and is not required to obtain a school bus endorsement.**

(18) **In addition to other restrictions of issuance, a Missouri driver license will not be issued to an individual unless and until any previously issued Missouri or out-of-state driver license and any Missouri or out-of-state nondriver identification card is surrendered or a statement that the physical card was lost, destroyed, or stolen. An individual may hold either a valid Missouri driver license or nondriver identification card, but not both.**

(A) **As part of the requirements to transition to one (1) license or one (1) nondriver identification card requirement, any person previously issued a Missouri driver license and a nondriver identification card will be required to surrender one (1) of the credential types at the time of their next application for any new, renewal, or duplicate.**

(B) **The holder of a Missouri driver license may during a period of suspension, revocation, denial, or disqualification of their driving privilege elect to surrender the physical driver license and obtain a nondriver identification card. A nondriver identification card issued during any period of suspension, revocation, denial, or disqualification will be required to surrender the nondriver identification card to be eligible for return or issuance of a driver license. Any**

applicable fees will apply.

(C) **The holder of a Missouri driver license or nondriver license may hold a valid noncommercial instruction permit if other testing and eligibility conditions for the permit class type requested are met.**

(D) **The holder of a valid, unexpired Missouri driver license may hold a commercial learner's permit if other permit testing and eligibility conditions are met.**

(A) Beginning October 1, 2022, the tax rate will be one dollar and fifty-eight cents (\$1.58) per mile. MO HealthNet Division will have the discretion to adjust the tax rate on a quarterly basis. No ambulance service reimbursement allowance shall be collected by the Department of Social Services if the federal Centers for Medicare *[and]*& Medicaid Services (CMS) determines that such reimbursement allowance is not authorized under Title XIX of the Social Security Act; *[and]*

**(B) Beginning October 1, 2023, the tax rate will be eighty-five cents (\$0.85) per mile. MO HealthNet Division will have the discretion to adjust the tax rate on a quarterly basis. No ambulance service reimbursement allowance shall be collected by the Department of Social Services if the federal Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) determines that such reimbursement allowance is not authorized under Title XIX of the Social Security Act; and**

*[(B)](C)* For each year (October thru September), the total tax amount collected shall not exceed six percent (6%) of emergency ambulance gross receipts in the aggregate as reported in subparagraph (1)(B)2.H.

**13 CSR 70-25.160 Doula Services**

*PURPOSE: This rule establishes the Department of Social Services' MO HealthNet Division guidelines regarding coverage and reimbursement for community doula services. The goal of these services is to provide a stable source of psychosocial support and education throughout the perinatal period and during the birth utilizing specially trained lay providers to enhance relevant knowledge and encourage healthy behaviors that can lead to improved pregnancy-related outcomes.*

*PUBLISHER'S NOTE: The secretary of state has determined that the publication of the entire text of the material which is incorporated by reference as a portion of this rule would be unduly cumbersome or expensive. This material as incorporated by reference in this rule shall be maintained by the agency at its headquarters and shall be made available to the public for inspection and copying at no more than the actual cost of reproduction. This note applies only to the reference material. The entire text of the rule is printed here.*

(1) Administration. Doula services shall be administered by the MO HealthNet Division. Doula services covered and not covered, the limitations under which services are covered, and the maximum allowable fees for all covered services shall be determined by the MO HealthNet Division and shall be included in the MO HealthNet Physician Provider Manual, which is incorporated by reference and made part of this rule as published by the Department of Social Services, MO HealthNet Division, 615 Howerton Court, Jefferson City, MO 65109, at its website <https://mydss.mo.gov/media/pdf/physicians-provider-manual>, October 1, 2024. This rule does not incorporate any subsequent amendments or additions.

(A) In the administration of the rule, "doula services" means services that provide a stable source of psychosocial support and education throughout the perinatal period and during the birth utilizing trained providers, community-based doulas, with the aim of improving a range of maternal and infant health outcomes by enhancing relevant knowledge and encouraging healthy behaviors. Doula services are available to all pregnant women, prenatally, during delivery, and throughout the postpartum period. This includes twelve (12) months after delivery.

(2) Provider Participation. To be eligible for participation in the doula services program –

(A) Doula providers must be enrolled as MO HealthNet providers;

(B) All doula providers must be at least eighteen (18) years of age and must possess a current certificate issued by a national or Missouri-based doula training organization whose curriculum meets the following definition and standards:

1. Curriculum that covers a doula's role, which includes breastfeeding support, perinatal mood and anxiety disorders, anticipatory care strategies, cultural competency, how to deliver perinatal education and support, how to increase client autonomy during birth, and how to support clients who may need additional care;

2. Understanding the importance of health-related social needs, including navigation of social services, trauma-



informed care, and strategies specific to the community served;

3. The student must successfully complete the training program and be deemed competent to provide doula services. Certification is attained after evaluation by a birth professional or trainer;

4. Completion of at least six (6) continuing education unit (CEU) hours per year, or equivalent continuing education as specified by the training organization; and

5. Holds liability insurance as an individual or through a supervising organization; and

(C) For doulas whose training came from another source, or from multiple sources, MO HealthNet will determine eligibility for reimbursement as follows:

1. If there exists any statewide organization composed of doula trainers from three (3) or more independent, well-established doula training organizations located in Missouri whose purpose includes validation of core competencies of trainings, then MO HealthNet may verify that an individual's training and experience satisfies the above-stated criteria through a public roster maintained by such an organization; and

2. If no such organization exists, future doula training organizations must prove that their training satisfies the above definition in order to be added to the written policy guide.

(3) Participant Eligibility. Any pregnant woman who is eligible for Title XIX benefits from the Family Support Division (FSD) and requests doula services in accordance with the procedures described in this rule shall be deemed eligible to receive these services.

(4) Doula Services.

(A) Doula services are available to all pregnant women, prenatally, during delivery, and throughout the postpartum period. This includes twelve (12) months after delivery. Doula services include a combined total of six (6) prenatal and postpartum support sessions, one (1) birth attendance, and up to two (2) visits for general consultation on lactation. Community navigation services that occur outside these billable visits may be billed up to ten (10) times total over the course of the pregnancy and postpartum period. The focus of these services is to provide a stable source of psychosocial support and education in an informal setting utilizing trained non-medical, non-clinical providers, with the aim of reducing allostatic load and oxidative stress, enhancing relevant knowledge and encouraging healthy behaviors that can lead to improved pregnancy-related outcomes (in particular, reduced preterm birth rates, reduced low-birthweight rates, reduced maternal morbidity and mortality, and reduced infant mortality). Reduced Caesarian section rates, improved maternal satisfaction with the birth experience, increased breastfeeding initiation and continuation rates, and enhanced parenting knowledge and confidence are also intended outcomes. Doula services include –

1. Prenatal support sessions – promoting health literacy and knowledge of what to expect during pregnancy and birth; what experiences are normal during pregnancy; how to relay concerns to providers; and providing information on topics such as nutrition, exercise, tobacco cessation, self-monitoring of existing health risks or conditions, in a manner that is culturally relevant and that is targeted to Medicaid participants. A doula may attend the participant's obstetric (OB) visits in a supportive role;

2. Community navigation of social services and assistance programs – taking a community-based approach to connect expecting women and families with available resources, including understanding the services and supports available to pregnant and postpartum women on Medicaid and facilitating access to those resources based upon an assessment of social service needs;

3. Attendance and support during birth – providing information about what to expect during birth; helping create a birth plan; and attending the birth to provide physical comfort measures, information, emotional support and advocacy throughout the labor, including support of personal and cultural preferences regarding childbirth; in particular to support those who may otherwise feel disconnected from or marginalized by the healthcare system;

4. Lactation education and support – may include any of the following:

A. A session during pregnancy that is primarily focused on the health benefits of breastfeeding for both mother and infant;

B. Also includes attending the mother and infant immediately after birth to provide guidance and goal setting to promote breastfeeding;

C. Providing ongoing support education during pregnancy on the health benefits of breastfeeding; and

D. Providing ongoing support and referral to licensed lactation professionals if/when services are needed; and

5. Postpartum support sessions – helping women know what to expect, what is normal, how to relay concerns to providers; aiding the transition back to well-woman care, family planning, screening for postpartum depression; providing information on topics such as safe sleep, preventing unintended child injuries, nutrition, positive parenting skills; education about breastfeeding rights; and goal setting for the future including continuing education, finding employment and childcare, and transition to other insurance as needed.

(5) Records Retention. Providers who provide doula services must follow 13 CSR 70-3.030.

(6) Reimbursement Methodology.

(A) MO HealthNet provides reimbursement to enrolled providers providing doula services who currently hold a certificate as described in subsection (2)(B) and are in good standing with the state.

(B) Reimbursement for services is made on a fee-for-services basis. The maximum allowable fee for a unit of service has been determined by MO HealthNet to be a reasonable fee, consistent with efficiency, economy, and quality of care. Payment for covered services is the lower of the provider's actual billed charge (should be the provider's usual and customary charge to the general public for the service), or the maximum allowable per unit of service. Reimbursement shall only be made for services authorized by MO HealthNet or its designee. Services will be paid at the Medicaid fee schedule rate and will be published at <https://mydss.mo.gov/mhd/cpt>.

There is potential for an offsetting savings in year two and beyond based on the potential reduction in the Cesarean rate as well as other improved birth outcomes.

Evidence suggests that about half of spending on doula services will directly create savings due to reduced C-section rates. It is anticipated that the comprehensive psychosocial support during the prenatal period will improve birth outcomes, reducing costs associated with severe maternal morbidity and prematurity/low-birthweight. While exact projections are not available, the assumption is that by Year 3, with doula carefully incorporated into the care continuum for at-risk Medicaid pregnancies, the offsetting savings will cover the costs to create budget neutrality

(2) The general administration and the responsibility for the proper operation of the system is vested in a board of trustees consisting of seven (7) persons. *[Three (3) trustees are elected by the employees who participate in the system, three (3) trustees are elected by the members of the governing bodies of those political subdivisions which participate in the system] Six (6) trustees are elected in accordance with the procedure described in 16 CSR 20-2.150, and one (1) trustee is appointed by the governor. The board of trustees employs an executive secretary, who may also be referred to as the executive director, not one (1) of their number, who shall be the executive officer of the board and a chief investment officer, not one (1) of their number, who shall report directly to the board on all system investment activity. The board also may employ or contract for the services of actuaries, legal advisors, investment counselors, medical advisors, certified public accountants, and such other service providers as the board shall deem necessary.*

1. The employer delegate shall be an officer of an employer certified to the board by the governing body of that employer to be their representative.

2. The employee delegate shall be an employee of an employer and elected by the collective employees of that employer. The secretary or clerk of the employer shall certify to the board the name of the employee delegate and that this name was obtained by an election consisting of a secret ballot wherein all employees were afforded the opportunity to vote;

(B) The board shall designate a time and place to hold an annual meeting at which elections of trustees will be conducted;

(C) For each class of elected trustee identified in section 70.605, RSMo, delegates from the same class shall elect a successor trustee; and

(D) For any class of trustee identified in section 70.605, RSMo, that is not either an employer or employee, all delegates, collectively, shall elect a successor trustee.

(2) Nothing in this rule shall otherwise prohibit the board, with the approval of the delegates from further establishing rules related to the manner in which an election is conducted.

**20 CSR 2110-2.130 Dental Hygienists.** The board is amending sections (3) and (4), adding new section (11), and renumbering as necessary.

*PURPOSE: This proposed amendment will allow dental hygienists to administer local anesthetic under the general supervision of a licensed dentist.*

(3) A hygienist may perform the following procedures under general supervision:

(E) **Administering local anesthesia, as outlined in sections (9), (10), and (11) of this rule; and**

[(E)](F) All procedures delegable to a dental assistant or certified dental assistant, except the expanded functions in section (5) of this rule.

(4) A hygienist may perform the following procedures under indirect supervision:

[(B)] *Administering local anesthesia, as outlined in sections (9) and (10) of this rule;*

[(C)](B) Procedures deemed appropriate by a dentist as outlined in section 332.091, RSMo; and

[(D)](C) All procedures allowed under general supervision as outlined in section (3) of this rule.

(11) A hygienist may administer local anesthesia under general supervision to a patient of record of the supervising dentist. A written authorization shall be included in the patient's record prior to the administration of local anesthesia under general supervision. The supervising dentist shall document the applicable American Society of Anesthesiologists (ASA) classification in the patient record. ASA class III patients may be administered local anesthesia under general supervision after a consultation with the applicable physician of record. ASA class IV and V patients are not candidates for local anesthesia under general supervision. Patients being administered local anesthesia under general supervision must have been examined by the supervising dentist within the previous twelve (12) months. If the patient's medical history has changed since the last examination by the supervising dentist, the hygienist must consult with the dentist before administering local anesthetics. The supervising dentist shall be responsible for the care provided by the hygienist and shall ensure that the office is equipped with appropriate emergency equipment and that the staff are properly trained and competent to address emergency situations that may arise as a result of the administration of local anesthesia under general supervision.

#### PROPOSED RULE

#### 20 CSR 2110-2.134 Oral Preventive Assistant Pilot Project

*PURPOSE: This rule implements the provisions of section 332.325, RSMo, and creates temporary waivers of provisions of Chapter 332, RSMo, and previously promulgated regulations pursuant to section 332.325, RSMo.*

(1) Pursuant to the provisions of section 332.325, RSMo, the board is collaborating with the Office of Dental Health (ODH) within the Missouri Department of Health and Senior Services (DHSS) to create and approve pilot projects designed to examine new methods of extending care to medically underserved populations, as defined in 42 U.S.C. Section 300e-1(7). The project will temporarily create a new expanded functions dental assistant known as an oral preventive assistant that will provide limited dental hygiene services to patients in clinics selected by ODH in areas with significant shortages of practicing licensed dental hygienists.

(2) The objectives of this pilot project are to –

(A) Determine if the use of oral preventive assistants can improve access to care by assisting in a limited scope of practice with periodontally healthy patients and patients with reversible gingivitis by creating more portal entry appointment opportunities for patients;

(B) Assess the treatment outcomes of oral preventative assistants for periodontally healthy patients and patients with reversible gingivitis from a clinical and patient experience perspective; and

(C) Determine if the addition of oral preventive assistants to the oral healthcare workforce can improve access to care for patients with more serious periodontal problems by enabling dental hygienists and dentists to use time previously devoted to periodontally healthy patients to serve patients with more serious or urgent periodontal needs.

(3) This pilot project, as set forth in section (1) above, will necessitate a waiver of the following provisions of Chapter 332, RSMo, and previously promulgated regulations pursuant to section 332.325, RSMo:

(A) Specific provisions of sections 332.093, 332.098, and 332.101, RSMo, and 20 CSR 2110-2.120 in order to temporarily create a new expanded functions dental assistant known as an oral preventive assistant.

(4) The scope of practice for an oral preventive assistant shall be limited to taking and recording periodontal probe readings, documenting areas of periodontal concern, and supragingival scaling and polishing. Oral preventive assistants



shall be further limited to practicing on periodontally healthy patients or patients with reversible gingivitis.

(5) Oral preventive assistants shall complete a board approved oral preventive assistant expanded function training course and apply for an expanded function permit issued by the board. Before taking an oral preventive assistant expanded functions training course, a dental assistant shall successfully complete the Missouri Dental Assisting Skills exam administered by the Dental Assisting National Board or possess current certification as a Certified Dental Assistant from the Dental Assisting National Board.

(6) Patients receiving treatment from an oral preventive assistant shall be informed of the pilot project and shall provide written consent to receive treatment through the pilot project prior to receiving care.

(7) The number of facilities utilizing oral preventive assistants in a pilot project shall be limited to no more than twelve (12). The ODH shall provide a list of the approved dental facilities utilizing oral preventive assistants for a pilot project to the Missouri Dental Board. Of the facilities utilizing oral preventive assistants, at least half must be located in Missouri counties classified as class three (3) counties in accordance with section 48.020, RSMo.

(8) All facilities participating in a pilot project must have a policy for collecting and reporting feedback from both patients receiving care from as well as dental healthcare providers providing care through oral preventive assistants.

(9) All facilities participating in a pilot project shall accept patients enrolled in MO HealthNet.

(10) All facilities participating in a pilot project shall collect and submit the following data to the ODH on a monthly basis, which shall be provided to the Missouri Dental Board on a quarterly basis by the ODH:

(A) The number of new patients examined by all dental healthcare workers in the clinic during the reporting period, including a break-out of patients by age group (minors and adults) and periodontal diagnostic category (healthy, gingivitis, periodontitis as diagnosed by the supervising dentist);

(B) The number of patients seen by an oral preventive assistant during the reporting period, including a break-out of patients by age group (minors and adults) and periodontal diagnostic category (health, gingivitis, periodontitis as diagnosed by the supervising dentist);

(C) The number of new patients examined by all dental healthcare workers in the clinic during the reporting period of the calendar year prior to the current reporting period, including a break-out of patients by age group (minors and adults) and periodontal diagnostic category (healthy, gingivitis, periodontitis as diagnosed by the supervising dentist);

(D) The number of patients diagnosed with periodontitis during the reporting period;

(E) The number of patients diagnosed with periodontitis during the reporting period of the calendar year prior to the current reporting period;

(F) The number of gross debridement appointments during the reporting period;

(G) The number of gross debridement appointments during the reporting period of the calendar year prior to the current

reporting period;

(H) The number of scale and root plane appointments during the reporting period;

(I) The number of scale and root plane appointments during the reporting period of the calendar year prior to the current reporting period;

(J) The number of periodontal surgeries during the reporting period;

(K) The number of periodontal surgeries during the reporting period of the calendar year prior to the current reporting period;

(L) The number of periodontal maintenance appointments during the reporting period; and

(M) The number of periodontal maintenance appointments during the reporting period of the calendar year prior to the current reporting period.

(11) Each facility participating in a pilot project shall participate in an internal cohort study coordinated by the ODH to compare treatment outcomes of patients treated by oral preventive assistants to treatment outcomes of hygienists and dentists in the same clinic for comparable patient categories and the same finite period. The metrics that shall be used to assess the quality of oral preventive assistant treatment outcomes shall include at least the following:

(A) The percentage of patients categorized as healthy;

(B) The percentage of patients with improved outcomes as it relates to inflammation;

(C) The percentage of patients whose health status has not significantly improved or declined as it relates to localized problems;

(D) The percentage of patients whose health status has not significantly improved or declined as it relates to generalized inflammation; and

(E) Patient evaluation results of their treatment based on a Likert scale and open comment opportunities.

(12) Any adverse incident or injury to a patient during or as a result of care provided by an oral preventive assistant shall be reported directly to the Missouri Dental Board within two (2) business days of the supervising dentist learning of the incident or injury.

(13) The provisions of this rule shall only apply to dental healthcare workers providing services within an approved pilot project created through a collaboration between ODH and the board. The provisions of this rule and all associated pilot projects shall expire on August 28, 2026, in accordance with section 332.325, RSMo.

A notice of proposed rulemaking containing the text of the proposed amendment was published in the *Missouri Register* on December 15, 2023 (48 MoReg 2277-2284). Those sections with changes are reprinted here. This proposed amendment becomes effective thirty (30) days after publication in the *Code of State Regulations*.

SUMMARY OF COMMENTS: One internal staff comment was received.

COMMENT #1: The language of the original section (4) was inadvertently bracketed out.

RESPONSE: We are adding back in the language from the original section (4) that will be the second paragraph of section (1).

**12 CSR 10-2.015 Withholding of Tax**

(1) Registration of Employers. Every employer required to deduct and withhold any amount of tax under section 143.191, RSMo, must register with the Missouri Department of Revenue by completing the Missouri Tax Registration Application Form 2643 or through the online business registration feature on the Missouri Department of Revenue's website. A Missouri tax identification number will be assigned. A new registration is required, and a new Missouri tax identification number will be assigned, when any change in ownership or ownership type occurs. An employer who receives a new Missouri tax identification number as a result of a change in ownership type must file a Final Report Form 5633, to close the old account. These Missouri tax identification numbers are not transferable. It is recommended that the Missouri tax identification number be included in all reports and correspondence from the employer to the Missouri Department of Revenue concerning withholding. If a business is discontinued, transferred, or sold, or if an employer closes or indefinitely ceases to pay wages, the employer must close

the employer's withholding account by filing a Final Report (Form 5633). If the business of another employer is acquired, do not use the Missouri tax identification number assigned to that business; a new Missouri tax identification number must be obtained. Employer With More Than One (1) Payroll Unit – Complex Employer. If a consolidated report and remittance of the tax withheld cannot be made by the employer because of the complexity of the organization, branch offices, or divisions may be designated as withholding agents. These agents can perform the actual withholding and remitting. However, regardless of any internal arrangements which may be established by the complex employer, the legal responsibility and liability under the law still rests with the home office. If the complex employer has designated withholding agents, and the agents wish to claim the compensation deduction, only one (1) agent will be entitled to the full deduction and the remaining agents will be entitled to one-half of one percent (1/2%) deduction of income taxes withheld if the returns are filed timely.
