Storywalk Excitement in Adair County



The Adair County Public Library and Thousand Hills State Park collaborated to add a permanent storywalk fixture at the park. The library funded the project while Thousand Hills took care of construction. The storywalk was placed along a paved trail for families to enjoy as they walk near the lake. Additionally, the library's Dial-A-Story phone line offers each month's selection for families to listen to as they walk the trail or enjoy while at home. The city of Kirksville's Chamber of Commerce held a ribbon-cutting ceremony April 14 to celebrate the opening of the storywalk.

Missouri Evergreen Celebrates its 10-Year Anniversary

During the June Missouri Public Library Directors conference in Cape Girardeau, Missouri, Evergreen celebrated its 10-year anniversary. Directors of Missouri Evergreen libraries wore mint green t-shirts celebrating this milestone on the last day of the conference.

Missouri Evergreen Consortium began in 2011 when the Missouri State Library proposed a plan to establish a statewide network that would allow public libraries to share their books, audiobooks, music CDs, and DVD movies with other libraries.

Eleven libraries joined the consortium in the first active year, with Poplar Bluff Municipal Library being the first member library to join on July 1, 2012. The other libraries to join in FY13 were Grundy County Jewett Norris Library, Marshall Public Library, Carrollton Public Library, Lebanon-Laclede County Library, Stone County Library, Webster County Library, Doniphan-Ripley County Library, Albany Carnegie Public Library, Howard County Public Library, and Little Dixie Regional Libraries.

Over the next ten years, membership grew to include 60 Missouri public libraries, all sharing

the same ILS and freely exchanging materials to benefit their patrons. Users at these libraries can borrow from a collection of almost four million items with a simple click of a button. Missouri Evergreen's combined collection is larger than any other single library collection in the state.

As of April 30, 2022, the consortium served 865,577 patrons, had 3,866,068 items and 1,359,697 bibliographic records in the catalog, and shared 314,463 among consortium member libraries (156,553 items requested and 157,910 items lent). A statewide courier delivery service transports requested items to the patron's home library. More than 40% of Missouri's public libraries of all sizes are currently Missouri Evergreen Consortium members. Based on the number of residents, the largest library is Scenic Regional Library with more than 140,000 residents, and the smallest member library is Albany Carnegie Library with fewer than 1,700 residents.

Congratulations to Missouri Evergreen and its member libraries for serving their patrons and Missouri citizens for 10 years. The Missouri State Library wishes you continued success!

Backed by industry giants and classroom leaders, Code.org has amazing resources for learners and educators. and libraries can use Code.org resources to display computer science and all that it has to offer without having to invest resources of your own. Know and Go: Engaging Beginning Readers in the Library, Monday, July 11, 1:30 - 2:30 p.m.

The transition from early reader to independent reader can be an exciting time for young library users and their families, even as it poses challenges as families look for the best books to help these skills grow. Introduction to Health Literacy for Libraries, Thursday, July 21, 10 a.m. - 12 p.m.

Health Literacy is the ability to obtain, process and understand basic health information and services. The National Assessment of Adult Literacy indicates only 12% of Americans have necessary health literacy skills, which include locating health services, understanding drug labels and following treatment instructions. Libraries are a natural conduit for working to improve the health literacy of their communities. Through print and digital resources, programs

and partnerships – libraries can bring attention to the critical need for health literacy. Learning objectives for this session include describing facets of both personal and organizational health literacy, discussing types of library resources available and reference support for health literacy, and developing library programs for “Healthy People 2030”, a health literacy initiative from U.S. Health and Human Services. 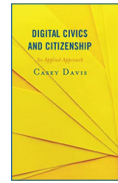

to Missouri public libraries certified to receive FY22 state aid, Missouri school libraries publicly supported and publicly controlled, and Missouri academic libraries supported publicly or privately.
