MAIN FFATURE Mixed Media Wanderlust

When I was a young girl I would spend hours immersing myself in the pages of an old stained and torn world atlas at my grandmother's house, saying out loud the names of exotic cities and countries and imagining the day when I would be able to travel to them. I was allowed to add sticky notes and dots to the places I wanted to go to and I remember at one stage adding a dot to every interesting place I found within the parameters of the equator, stretching out towards the tropics of Cancer and Capricorn.

Now in my fifties, I've been lucky enough to have travelled to many amazing places teaching my workshops and retreats and gathering inspiration for paintings. We live in Australia and although we have travelled as far North as the breathtaking fjords of Norway and south to the stunning landscape of New Zealand, the tropics and warmer climates still hold a special place in my heart. My mixed media Wanderlust series reflects that, incorporating snippets of memory and imagery from my explorations in Bali, Cambodia, Fiji, and Mexico.

Our family has always been open to spontaneous travel, chance meetings with strangers who become friends, and serendipitous unfoldings. In many ways my art practice is like this too, allowing for accidental happenings that may lead me in a new direction, listening to my intuition to decide the next move, and embracing the contrast in the painting experience, knowing that we can oscillate from frustration to flow and back again in a session.

In this tutorial I start with a pristine piece of

Strathmore Series 300 Watercolor paper but often I'll begin by painting over a "failed" piece allowing the underlayers to bring mystery and interesting textures and marks to the painting that evolves. I work mostly on Strathmore Watercolor paper both in my own work and my tutorials, and I love the way that I am able to apply fluid layers of Daler Rowney acrylic inks, other acrylic media, pencil, oil pastel, pen, and handmade collage papers. The paper takes all of these beautifully.









TUTORIAL



Step 1: For this tutorial I'm using paper from an 18 x 24" Strathmore 300 Series Watercolor pad (cut down to 18 x 18"). I generally tape medium to large works on paper to my working surface using masking tape or blue painter's tape. I like the clean framed edge this provides and it also allows my collectors to add matte and frame without losing any of the image.

Step 2: Using charcoal I loosely sketch in the major elements of my composition as a guide, knowing that I can change, paint over, and add details as I go along.









Step 3: Beginning with a palette of Phthalo Turquoise and Quinacridone Burnt Orange fluid acrylics (mixed together they make a beautiful rich dark), I begin with some expressive mark making which will give me interesting textures in the underlayer. I often take a trip into the garden to find mark making tools and also use pencil, oil pastel, and stencils in this layer.



Step 4: I add to the palette Teal, Golden Nickel Azo Yellow, and titanium white fluid acrylics, and Flame Orange and Ultramarine acrylic ink.

Blocking in color across most of the imagery, I begin to add in a few trees and details thinking of contrasting elements, lights on darks and smaller details on top of larger color swatches. I allow colors to blend in areas that are still slightly wet and add glazes over some dry areas to create depth and variation of color. I add in deeper Ultramarine Blue in drops over the dry teal river, spread the color with a little water and then drop in 100% isopropyl alcohol for a resist effect through to the teal underlayer.

Allow to dry at this point.







Step 5: I keep a stash of handmade papers in my studio, roughly organized into color families, and love to bring them into my Wanderlust paintings as an extra element of texture and surprise! Tissue paper and old sewing patterns are two of my favorite things to make marks on and use in collage. They are thin enough to integrate well into the painting and their transparency allows the underlayers to be visible.

I always aim for a balance between collaged and painted areas and I try out both torn and cut shapes in different areas before committing to gluing them down with matte medium. In this piece I break with the mostly complementary color scheme of blues and oranges, adding in several collage pops in shades of pale to hot pink!



Step 6: In the final stage I add details in paint pen, paint, and gel pens, looking for a pleasing balance in both lights, darks, and midtones as well as patterned, plain areas, and color. Often my last move will be to use a light wash of Daler Rowney white acrylic ink to brighten the sky and add highlights across the work.




