Spirit Of The Sunflower

Hello, my name is Carolyn Gavin and I'm an
artist from Toronto, Canada.

I love painting flowers, nature, animals, and
abstracts. Flowers in all shapes and sizes
inspire me and I'm constantly trying to

perfect the art of simplification and trying
to encapsulate the true spirit of whatever
flower I'm looking at. To add meaning to
the work makes it more interesting and gives
it depth. In this case, the subject is
the Sunflower.

Sunflowers have always been special to me. They represent warmth, beauty, strength and resilience. I have, however, always found them too difficult to paint. When I learned that they are Ukraine's national flower, I found myself intrigued and wanted to get over my issue with them.

I didn't know this but they are a highly productive and major agricultural export of Ukraine. Here's a little bit of history – back in June 1966, Sunflowers were planted in a ceremony at a Ukraine missile base to mark Ukraine giving up Nuclear weapons.

They have quickly become a symbol of resistance but also peace. Their exuberance and lively form represent the antithesis of destruction. They have become iconic. I had to paint them. So here is a bit by bit demonstration of "Sunflower with hands", for peace in Ukraine.

I don't typically sketch out paintings but for this one, I wanted to get it right. I needed a sketch to emphasize the large scale of the flower with small hands below. The contrast in size was important.



STEP 1

I've always believed in using the best materials possible. Your work can only improve and be the best if you do so. In this case, a slightly textured toothy sheet by Saunders Waterford was the best option. Cold pressed, 100% cotton, acid free, archival. Size 10 x 14" I sketched out my vision with the lightest pencil possible and I was ready to go.



STEP 2

Using a very large size 21 brush, I lay down the yellow watercolor using the side of the brush to start. I'm not a traditional watercolorist by any means, and don't start off with the lightest layer possible. Just a medium tone of Cadmium Yellow deep will do just fine for the first layer. Painting the larger areas first and putting down the base color helps with getting your composition right. Not focusing on details just yet is an important first step. I used wet on wet for the middle and just paint on the brush for the petals.

STEP 3

Keeping it loose and light, I add a brown pigment as I'm going along for some contrast and texture. At this point I added a Sap Green to the middle and bit of Yellow Ochre to the yellow watery petals.



STEP 4

I started next on the leaves and stem with Sap and Terre Verte Greens, plus yellows for limey tones. By this point I'm using softer watercolor brushes.

STEP 5, LAST STEP

Now comes the fun. Using an ink pen with a nice tip, I add the black ink details on top of the almost dry paint. I draw in the hands holding the flower and add fine lines for detail. In this case

I also used bit of light brilliant pink in the petals and Cobalt Turquoise light blue for the leaf lines and a few spots on the flower. White dots add the finishing touch for a bit more interest

and texture. There is some bleeding with the ink on the paint and this is a nice surprise, all adding to the finished piece for "peace".

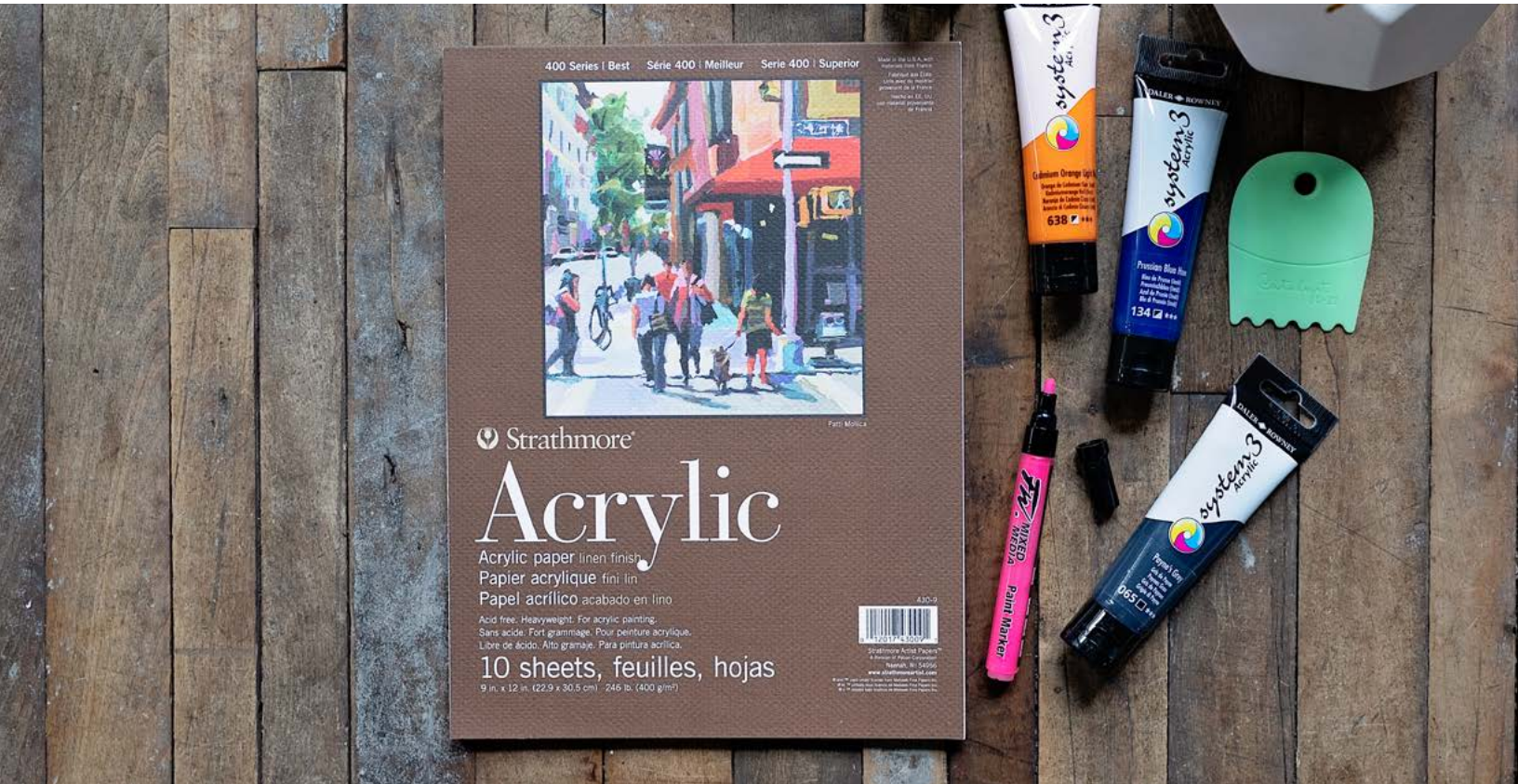

**Interview with
 Shayda Campbell**

Who are you and what do you do?

My name is Shayda Campbell, and I'm a Canadian artist and YouTube content creator. I share two videos a week encouraging adults to get creative and my video tutorials typically involve watercolor painting, drawing or journaling.

How and when did you get into art?

I can't remember a time when art wasn't a part of my life. Some of my earliest memories are coloring at the kitchen table. I would dedicate myself to massive crayon projects and go through stacks of paper (my dad brought scrap computer paper home from the office for me). I had a real need to be creative and I found crafting and drawing very exciting.

How has your practice changed over time?

My art practice has changed as much as I have! It's grown with me throughout my life. I was a super creative kid, always painting, decorating my playhouse, crafting costumes, making cards and gifts for friends and family; I took so much joy in being creative. But in high school I got serious about my pencil sketching and I let myself and my art practice be ruled by this desire for perfection. Art became stressful

and predictable, and after high school I stopped drawing and painting altogether. During my twenties I only got creative once in a while, and it was always a practical matter, like doing the chalkboards at work or making a birthday card for a friend. Then, around my 30th birthday, I felt a desire to be more creative. I was going through some mental health struggles at that time, and I just felt like trying new things, learning, creating, and sharing online. I got some library books and began with candy making, leather working, knitting, and furniture refinishing. I shared all of it on my blog which later became [my YouTube channel](#). At that time, I also decided to try making art again and chose to focus on watercolor painting because it had always scared me. Now my art practice is rooted in my childhood love of crafting, drawing, and trying new things. I love to grab a book from the library and learn a new creative skill or build on an existing one.
