24	THE CHAIRMAN: All right. Good

1	afternoon. Thank you, everyone, for
2	joining us today. The Board met in
3	executive session prior to this
4	meeting to discuss legal matters.
5	All written comments and voice
6	mail messages that have been received
7	today will be included in the official
8	Board Meeting transcript, which will
9	then be posted to the SEPTA website.
10	If there are speakers who wish
11	to address items on today's agenda,
12	you will be called on before the Board
13	votes. Please limit your remarks to
14	two minutes.
15	Sue Sanderson will present the
16	following resolution.
17	Sue?
18	Good afternoon. I'm here today
19	to ask that the Board approve the
20	memorandum of agreement reached
21	between the Authority and the
22	International Brotherhood of Teamsters
23	Local 500. IBT 500 represents
2 4	approximately 330 employees including

1	various skilled positions such as
2	medical technicians, customer service
3	representatives, storeroom keepers,
4	telecommunication technicians, and
5	others throughout the Authority.
6	The IBT 500 agreement was set
7	to expire at midnight on January 17th;
8	however, the parties reached an
9	agreement on January 16th. The
10	agreement was ratified by the union
11	membership on Sunday, January 21st.
12	The agreement is for one year,
13	fits within the Authority's budget,
1 4	and is consistent with the pattern
15	established by TWU 234.
16	I request that the Board
17	approve the memorandum of agreement.
18	THE CHAIRMAN: Great. Thank
19	you.
2 0	Do we have any speakers who
21	wish to comment? Carol, anybody?
22	We'll entertain a motion to
2 3	adopt this resolution.
2 4	VICE CHAIRMAN LAWRENCE: So

1	moved.
2	MR. ELLIS: Second.
3	THE CHAIRMAN: Any questions or
4	comments?
5	Hearing none, I'll call the
6	question.
7	All in favor, say "aye."
8	ALL: Aye.
9	THE CHAIRMAN: Any abstentions?
10	The resolution is adopted.
11	All right. We are starting off
12	2024 much like it ended last year,
13	facing a major funding challenge.
14	Efforts are continuing with our
15	funding partners in Harrisburg to find
16	a solution.
17	There are a number of great
18	efforts to improve service for our
19	customers underway, and we want to
20	ensure funding is there to support
21	these initiatives.
22	For example, we will vote today
23	on a plan to redesign the bus network
24	so that customers have more reliable

1	and efficient service. With full
2	funding support, much more is
3	possible.
4	As many of you know, this is my
5	last meeting as chairman of the SEPTA
6	Board. It has been my honor to serve
7	in this role. There will be more to
8	say about this later, but I just want
9	to say how grateful I am to everybody
10	here at SEPTA. I know we have a great
11	leadership ready to step up on the
12	SEPTA Board, and I wish you all the
13	best.
14	Vice Chairman Lawrence would
15	like to be recognized.
16	
1.6	VICE CHAIRMAN LAWRENCE: I
17	VICE CHAIRMAN LAWRENCE: I would. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

1 25-year tenure here.

As everyone here knows, after
29 years as a member of the Board and
the last 25 years as chairman, this is
Chairman Deon's final Board meeting,
and we didn't want to let this moment
pass without taking the opportunity to
say thank you for your years of
service and to congratulate you as you
conclude nearly 30 years of service on
this Board.

And to put this in perspective, SEPTA marks its 60th anniversary this year. So for over half of that time, you've been here in a leadership position.

SEPTA and our region are better for your service, and you should take pride in knowing that you leave SEPTA strong enough to weather the significant challenges ahead and nimble enough to seize new opportunities.

On a personal note, you know,

1	we've worked together very closely for
2	the last 11 or 12 years. We both
3	enjoy beers and cigars and we love our
4	families. You've taught me a lot
5	about SEPTA, about leadership, and I
6	just want to say personally, it's been
7	my privilege to be able to be
8	alongside you during this time.
9	But there are many who are
10	joining us today to celebrate your
11	legacy and the mark you have left on
12	this transit agency and the region it
13	serves.
14	And to get us started, it's my
15	pleasure to introduce the SEPTA CEO
16	and general manager, Leslie Richards.
17	MS. RICHARDS: Thank you, Vice
18	Chairman.
19	I know, also, a lot of people
20	want to say thank you because there's
21	a lot of thanks here.
22	So I personally want to say
23	thank you, Chairman, but I also speak
2 4	for over 9,000 employees here as well

1 who want to say thank you.

We're very grateful for your 24 years of service to SEPTA as the chairman of our Board. For many of us, you're the only chairman that we've ever known, and during that extraordinary tenure, Chairman Deon has put SEPTA on sounder financial footing than it was definitely in 1999 when you joined.

We've benefited greatly from your relationships, from your political skills. I'm honored that I got to see many of them close up and see how you do your little magic that you do, not quite sure how to categorize it, but you do know how to work both sides of the aisle -- you're masterful, you're skillful -- brokering deals to stabilize state funding for public transit. You have always been a voice for us.

With that, I know that so many other people also want to lend their

1	congratulations. I will keep it short
2	as a favor.
3	THE CHAIRMAN: Thank you.
4	MS. RICHARDS: So
5	congratulations on this extremely
6	well-deserved retirement.
7	THE CHAIRMAN: Thank you.
8	VICE CHAIRMAN LAWRENCE: Thank
9	you, Leslie.
10	I'm kind of taking over here
11	now, Pat, so just sit back, relax.
12	Just let it happen.
13	It's now my pleasure to
14	introduce a good friend of Chairman
15	Deon and a good friend of mine as
16	well, his hometown senator, Senator
17	Frank Farry.
18	Senator Farry has been a
19	long-time supporter of SEPTA and
20	worked to pass Act 89 in 2013 when he
21 .	was a member of the house.
22	Senator Farry, thank you for
23	being here today.
2 4	SENATOR FERRY: Thank you, Ken.

I appreciate the opportunity to be here.

As Ken mentioned, I've been a long-time friend of Pat and his family. I've actually served as his volunteer fire chief in addition to having spent 14 years as his state rep and now his state senator.

I always joked when I was his rep that that literally he was my most high-maintenance constituent out of 65,000 people. Now I can say it's out of 270,000 people, but that is said with admiration, because that high maintenance is based on his efforts and his advocacy in large part for SEPTA and for our community.

And Pat is always to the point.

I think we all know that. There's no beating around the bush. You know what his efforts are, and his efforts are very strong. You know, there's big shoes to fill here by Ken and the rest of the Board members, and I wish

1	you the best in doing that, but I
2	don't think SEPTA would be where it is
3	today without Pat's efforts.
4	You know, we had some
5	challenges with Act 89 and some of the
6	other advocacy efforts we've had in
7	Harrisburg, but we fought hard to get
8	that done and you led the way in a lot
9	of that and you deserve the
10	recognition for it.
11	I have a senate citation, which
12	because of time, I won't read all the
13	"whereas" and conclude with "now,
1 4	therefore," but you are being
15	recognized by the state senate for
16	your tenure here, and we also had a
17	state flag dedicated to you as well.
18	So I'd like to come and present that.
19	(Applause.)
2 0	VICE CHAIRMAN LAWRENCE: All
21	right. Thank you, Senator Farry.
22	I'm now pleased to introduce
23	Chairman Deon's state representative,
2 4	Joe Hogan, who has a presentation on

behalf of the Pennsylvania House of 1 2 Representatives. 3 Representative Hogan. REPRESENTATIVE HOGAN: Thank 4 you, Ken. 5 6 You know, I want to echo a lot 7 of the comments that Senator Farry 8 iust made. I have only had the 9 opportunity to represent Pat for one year, and I don't think he was as 10 11 challenging for me as he was for the 12 senator, so I want to thank you for 13 that. 14 I do have, as the senator does, 15 a resolution recognized from the 16 entire Bucks County delegation of the 17 House of Representatives, because I 18 think everyone -- Democrat, 19 Republican -- in Bucks County knows 20 how hard you've worked for the last 29 21 years representing this Authority, and 22 it's not every day that I, in this new

been working and volunteering and

role, get to recognize somebody that's

23

serving their community for almost as long as I've been alive.

That is very impactful, very meaningful when we get to do that, because we have a shortage of that in our society right now, people that are dedicated to giving back.

And I was thinking of some things, I was thinking of some of my friends, and there's probably one person that I think should be here but he can't be, and that's my former boss, my friend, and I think yours as well, Pat, our former congressman, Mike Fitzpatrick.

And correct me if I'm wrong, but I think Mike may have appointed you to SEPTA when he was a Bucks County commissioner.

THE CHAIRMAN: He did.

REPRESENTATIVE HOGAN: So I was actually fortunate enough to be gifted some of his collectible pins and things he had as a member of Congress,

and I'm actually wearing one of his
now from 2012 when SEPTA was
recognized as the transportation
agency of the year throughout the
United States. So I think a little
bit of him is with us today.

But I want to congratulate you, and I'm also not going to read the citation. You'll have plenty of time in retirement to do that. So I would like to come up as well and present it to you. So thank you.

(Applause.)

VICE CHAIRMAN LAWRENCE: Thank you, Representative Hogan.

Under Chairman Deon's

leadership, SEPTA has formed strong

and productive partnerships with each

county, not just Bucks County, and

also the City of Philadelphia. And we

are pleased to be joined here today by

Philadelphia City Councilman Mike

Driscoll, who is also the new chair of

the Committee on Transportation and

1	Public Otilities.
2	Councilman Driscoll.
3	COUNCILMAN DRISCOLL: Thank
4	you, Ken.
5	So I've never had the honor of
6	having the chairman as my constituent,
7	being from Northeast Philadelphia, but
8	I wouldn't if he was my
9 ,	constituent, I wouldn't say he was
10	high maintenance. I would have said
11	he was high impact, high energy, and
12	high deliverable.
13	Because I did have the pleasure
1 4	of working with you in my capacity in
15	the House of Representatives, only a
16	short time in my role here in the City
17	of Philadelphia, but I also did so
18	with admiration and respect.
19	I was a beneficiary of SEPTA's
20	hard work. I had a business here in
21	the City of Philadelphia, Finnigan's
22	Wake Bar and Catering Hall, and we
23	hosted the 2000 Republican National
24	Convention. And a lot of the way the

1 people were getting around then was 2 SEPTA. We also benefited from the 3 4 papal visit. We were closed or sold by the time of the 2016 -- '16, yes --5 6 Democratic National Convention, but 7 all those things were through your leadership. 8 9 And I know that you've set 10 SEPTA on the right course. 2026 is 11 gonna be a big year for the City of 12 Philadelphia in our 13 Semiquincentennial, and SEPTA is going 14 to play a big role. 15 I know things are going to go 16 in the right direction here. We're 17 very proud of you. And I, too, have a 18 citation on behalf of the entire city 19 council and our new Council President 20 Johnson, and I will also not read this 21 because I know you like to get through

So congratulations. We're proud of you.

these meetings quickly.

2	THE CHAIRMAN: Thank you.
3	VICE CHAIRMAN LAWRENCE: Thank
4	you, Councilman Driscoll.
5	Next, I'd like to invite our
6	police chief, Chief Charles Lawson, to
7	the podium for a presentation. He's
8	already there because he's always
9	ready.
10	CHIEF LAWSON: Appreciate that,
11	Ken.
12	Mr. Chairman I did not want to
13	let this opportunity pass without
1 4	formally thanking you for your
15	leadership and your support of the
16	transit police department over these
17	many years.
18	I'm convinced that without it,
19	we would not enjoy the professional
20	reputation that we do today. Whether
21	it was increasing officer safety by
22	equipping all police officers with
2 3	tasers, or helping us to be a national
2 4	leader in police transparency through

1	the early adoption of body-worn camera
2	system, or perhaps when we faced our
3	greatest threat, a staffing challenge
4	like we have never experienced before,
5	you were at the forefront helping to
6	increase pay for police officers,
7	letting us to become instantly
8	competitive, and closing a seventy
9	officer deficit in less than two
10	years.
11	And so, Mr. Chairman, on behalf
12	of a very grateful group of law
13	enforcement professionals, I want to
14	present you with our police department
15	accommodation for distinguished
16	lifetime service. I thank you for
17	everything you've done for us, sir.
18	(Applause.)
19	THE CHAIRMAN: Thank you.
20	VICE CHAIRMAN LAWRENCE: You
21	doing okay? We have more.
22	I'm sure everyone here on the
23	Board has a Pat Deon story that they
24	could share. We've got a couple in

the back. We're not going to do that

out here in front of the public, but

we are going to have two Board members

speak on behalf of all of us, and

first up is going to be Board Member

Bill Leonard.

MR. LEONARD: Thank you, Vice Chairman Lawrence.

Senator Farry, Representative
Hogan, and Councilman Driscoll each
captured how Chairman Deon has
leveraged political and personal
relationships to secure legislative
victories for SEPTA and strengthen the
Authority's reputation across
Pennsylvania.

Chairman Deon has been equally effective working at the federal level, and to help mark this special occasion, two of SEPTA's strongest champions in Washington, Congressman Brian Fitzpatrick and Congressman and former SEPTA Board Member Dwight Evans, jointly entered formal remarks

1	into the congressional record
2	recognizing Chairman Deon for his
3	nearly three decades of dedicated
4	service to Southeastern Pennsylvania
5	and the entire Commonwealth.
6	Congressman Fitzpatrick also
7	arranged to have this flag, US flag,
8	flown over the Capital in honor of
9	his of your contributions to SEPTA
10	and our region.
11	Mr. Chairman, the rule today is
12	that we're not allowed to read these
13	documents
1 4	THE CHAIRMAN: Thank you.
15	MR. LEONARD: to save time,
16	but they're fitting and lasting
17	tributes to all you have done for this
18	Authority and the customers we serve.
19	I'm honored to present them to you
20	now.
21	(Applause.)
22	VICE CHAIRMAN LAWRENCE: Thank
23	you, Bill.
2 4	Next up, I believe that Tom

1 Ellis is probably the longest tenured Board member after Chairman Deon, so 2 3 you'll become the longest after this but still the shortest. So we're 5 going to ask you to make a few remarks 6 for the Board for Chairman Deon. 7 MR. ELLIS: Thank you, Ken. 8 Can everybody see me above this? 9 10 I thought with Pat gone, I 11 wouldn't get these jokes. 12 VICE CHAIRMAN LAWRENCE: I just 13 wanted you to know it wasn't gonna 14 end. 15 MR. ELLIS: As the longest 16 serving member of the Board next to 17 Pat, I wanted to take this 18 opportunity, before making the 19 presentation on behalf of the Board 20 and all SEPTA employees, to make a few 21 comments about Pat, who is the reason 22 I actually returned to the Board after 23 a short hiatus.

When Pat took over the Board as

chairman 24 years ago, the meetings
would go well into the evening. Even
with Leslie's report, we rarely go
past 3:30, except for today I think
we're going to go way past.

The general manager at the time ignored the Board. The then general counsel hid things from the Board. The city representatives fought the suburban representatives, and the democrats on the Board fought the republicans.

But Pat put a stop to all of that. It wasn't easy and it wasn't overnight, and it certainly took a tremendous amount of a work.

Pat's known to be politically incorrect at times, but that's truly an act to cover for the most politically correct person I've ever dealt with. Pat is a man who treats everybody with respect and with a tinge of humor and a smile on his face, from those working in this

building to those driving buses on the front lines, from our terrific police officers to most of all our SEPTA riders.

Pat's concern has always been the SEPTA riders, especially those who have no other means of transportation to get to their jobs to keep our economy growing. Safe, clean, on-time transportation has always been Pat's mantra.

Pat was always able to cut through the clutter and come back to this Board's sole purpose, to provide safe, clean, on-time service to all of our riders.

For Pat's 24 years as chair, his work to unite the Board -- and rarely are votes close, or for that matter, not unanimous. As Pat works behind the scenes to address each Board member's concerns, withdrawing items until those concerns are met.

And each February for 24 years

1 when Pat would run for chair, even 2 though he know he had the votes, he 3 would call not only each Board member, but their appointing Authority 4 requesting their support once again. 5 6 That's the definition of humility. 7 But the real definition of Pat Deon is mensch, a term many of you in 8 9 the room understand, but if you don't, 10 you can come see me later. 11 That's the highest compliment 12 someone in his position can get. put his blood, sweat, and tears into 13 14 improving SEPTA and the lives of its 15 riders. He will be sorely missed, but 16 his insights will always be welcome. 17 And now for the presentation. 18 Pat, on behalf of the Board and 19 all of our SEPTA employees here and on 20 the front lines, we present you with 21 this commemorative bowl, which is not 22 for your cigar ashes. 23 And, Carlene, I would ask to

make sure he does not put his ashes in

1	here. And, Carlene, thank you for
2	sharing him with us all these years.
3	So, Pat, I'm going to give you
4	this bowl because they said if I broke
5	it, I bought it.
6	(Applause.)
7	VICE CHAIRMAN LAWRENCE: Now
8	I'd like us all to recognize Pat's
9	family. As you've heard, this has
10	been nearly 30 years of service.
11	You've all heard how much time
12	Pat has dedicated to this, so we want
13	to thank and acknowledge his family;
1 4	his wife, of course, Carlene, P.T. and
15	Justine and Chloe and Ashley. We want
16	to thank you all for sharing him with
17	us for all these years, but we want
18	you to know that he talks about you
19	all the time in between berating us
2 0	and insulting us and more things.
21	That's always the most pleasant part
2 2	of it.
2 3	So I'd like everyone to stand
2 4	and honor the Deon family.

1	(Applause.)
2	VICE CHAIRMAN LAWRENCE: All
3	right, Pat. We're almost there.
4 :	THE CHAIRMAN: We got ten
5	minutes left and we're going to the
6	regular meeting.
7	VICE CHAIRMAN LAWRENCE: We're
8	almost there. We have a whole nother
9	meeting after this. We have a lot of
10	public speakers.
11	Your legacy extends to every
12	part of this Authority and every
13	corner of our service territory. One
1 4	of the major milestones during your
15	chairmanship has been rebuilding the
16	system and replacing aging vehicles,
17	and we could not think of a more
18	fitting tribute than to name a vehicle
19	in your honor.
20	So I'm pleased to announce that
21	the SEPTA Locomotive 901 will forever
22	bear your name as it crisscrosses our
23	region. May it always run on time.
2 4	(Applause.)

1 VICE CHAIRMAN LAWRENCE: 2 Anything you'd like to say? 3 THE CHAIRMAN: Thank you. Is that it? 5 VICE CHAIRMAN LAWRENCE: For 6 now. 7 THE CHAIRMAN: Well, I'll try to be brief and thorough, and I hope 8 9 you don't mind if I read what is written down so that I don't miss 10 11 anything. 12 I'm here before you, surrounded 13 by my colleagues and friends and 14 family, so very humbled that you've 15 considered my retirement ceremony 16 worthy of your time today. 17 I am thankful to be honored 18 with the citations, flags, this 19 wonderful bowl, and a new locomotive 2.0 with my name on it. This is much, 21 much more than I could ever have hoped 22 for or expected. And that is exactly 23 how I feel about my 29 years here at

SEPTA.

I had no idea what I was

getting into when I was appointed to

this Board, and I had less of a clue

when I became chairman.

On day one, we had a strike.

Then later, I was informed of an ongoing FBI investigation. And more recently, we've persevered through a once-in-a-century pandemic. I do not have much hair, but whatever I had back then was absolutely on fire from the start.

But this agency is not what it was 29 years ago, and frankly, neither am I. The friendships that I have made here, the partnerships and relationships that we have forged across the political aisle, across the region and this state are just invaluable, and they mean the world to me.

And that is really where I want to begin my remarks, by thanking all of you, starting with my family.

Thank you for lending me to SEPTA 1 without restrictions. 2 I know that 3 this role consumed a lot of my time, 4 especially on every Thursday and with the phone calls at all hours of the 5 6 day and night. I appreciate your 7 patience through all the years, so thank you. 8

I'm not one for long speeches, but I'd like to take just a few minutes of time to look at where we started, what we have accomplished, and some challenges that are ahead of us.

Again, this agency is not what 1 it is today without the hard work and 2 dedication of our Board members, who 3 volunteer their time, energy, and efforts to this organization. 5 We represent different 6 7 communities on this Board, and we come 8 from different political parties. Wе work together as a team through 9 difficult decisions for SEPTA's 10 11 future. 12 Thank all of you. It's been a 13 great honor to work with all of you. I have worked alongside six 14 15 governors of both parties, five 16 Philadelphia mayors, and countless commissioners and councilmembers 17 18 across the region. 19 Some of the most important

Some of the most important changes we have made here occurred while working with divided government in Harrisburg. And that's because when we came here to this room to do this job, we always, always put this

agency, our employees, and our riders
above all else. The best customer
experience, period. And in the
process, as a team, we transformed
SEPTA.

We started by tightening up our finances, and I am very proud of the fact that we just marked 22 straight years of balanced budgets. Our \$2 billion annual budget includes capital dollars so that we can make real, long-lasting improvements to the system. We had to get creative, and we had to beat down doors in D.C. and Harrisburg.

This might shock some of you, but people did not just show up one day offering us cash money to rehab subway stations or restore train service. We took advantage of a federal program designed to encourage investment in public infrastructure.

Yes, the EB-5 program was controversial, but we were focused on

1 improving this system. We had to 2 pursue all options. That program 3 spurred \$400 million in critical 4 infrastructure projects across the 5 system. 6 We did rehab on subway 7 stations. 8

stations. We restored service on the Media/Elwyn Line and purchased new locomotives. Our new electronic fare collection system does not happen without this funding.

We sold station naming rights and advertising opportunities. The Jefferson Station, NRG Station, Wawa Station, Penn Medicine Station, and Drexel University Station; all these have helped fund long-lasting and significant investments.

We made investments in every part of this system with new buses, restored and improved rail lines, Market-Frankford El, and stations on the Broad Street Line.

And what has that funding meant

to the City of Philadelphia and the region? To name a few, national conventions, papal visits, and parades for our sports team champions.

Look ahead to 2026 when this region will host the FIFA World Cup, the Major League Baseball All-Star Game, and PGA Championship. 2026 also marks the 250th anniversary of this nation's founding, and this region will be at the center of that national celebration.

These events drive money into our economy. They put us in the national and international spotlight. People come here and they want to come back, or they come back here and decide to stay.

Today, SEPTA is a vital part -
I would argue the vital part -- of

this region's economy and growth.

SEPTA is the glue, the backbone, the

engine of that growth. We all know

that this region would not be and

could not be the economic powerhouse it is without SEPTA.

SEPTA today is not an afterthought when businesses look to invest here and create jobs. We are sitting at the table and working to attract new businesses and employers. There is a lot to be proud of here.

These accomplishments and transformation were critical in our work in Harrisburg to create a dedicated funding source for transit across the entire Commonwealth.

Everyone here understands what Acts 44 and 89 meant to our region and to our transit systems across the state. The dollars that have been invested will deliver returns for decades.

My relationships in Harrisburg that led to these measures changed the entire discussion about transit across the state. Transit is not viewed as an expense, but as an investment.

But Acts 44 and 89 have run 1 2 their course, so SEPTA needs to crank 3 up their work to make sure that the 4 current lawmakers and governor enact 5 sustainable, long-term funding for 6 transit, or we risk falling back. 7 have set a great record here and are hopeful this record will continue. 8 9 I want to close by making sure 10 everyone here understands what our 11 commitment to "best customer 12 experience" means. It is about our 13 ridership; the people who rely on 14 SEPTA every day. The national and international 15 16 events are wonderful and make for 17 great copy, but since the time I 18 started through this SEPTA journey, 19 and we have always put our riders 20 first. 21 Finally, working alongside all

Finally, working alongside all of you has been wonderful, and I will always hold dearly the memories and friendships made here at SEPTA. I
